





#### Soirees 1991

The Fischoff Association has created the "President's Soiree" for the many local residents who have enjoyed soirees in the past and have expressed an interest in attending these "mini-concerts" every year.

Through the generosity of the Springtime Soiree hosts and hostesses, the Fischoff Chamber Music Association is able to present to the local community some of the talent that assembles in South Bend for the Competition. These musical soirees not only provide good music, food and company in a comfortable setting, but also help to raise needed funds which support the excellence of the Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition.

#### "Getting to Know Chamber Music"

The Fischoff Association also enjoyed the cooperation of the South Bend Symphony in preparing this program. The symphony arranged for the woodwind quintet and the string quintet to demonstrate a variety of chamber music repertoire. Members of those ensembles were as follows: Woodwinds - Phil Isenberg, flute; Ricardo Castaneda, oboe; Denise Lum, clarinet; Lori Amada, horn; and Carol Cope, bassoon. The string ensemble included: J. Bradford Hair and Nick Orbovich, violins; Chris Bock, viola; Elizabeth Brauer, cello; and Ed Randles, bass. On Thursday, April 11 and Friday, April 12 music will flow with a richness, timbre and subtlety which is sometimes lost in a larger auditorium. A special thanks is extended to the hosts and hostesses of this year's Springtime Soirees and to the participating ensembles who share their music with the many fortunate guests.

## The Chester String Quartet

Widely recognized as one of America's most distinguished and sought after young chamber ensembles, the CHESTER STRING QUARTET has been called "one of the best and brightest of the country's young string quartets" by the *Boston Globe*. Fulfilling the promise of excellence recognized when awarded first prize in the 1985 Discovery Competition, they also are the only American quartet with the distinction of winning top prizes at the international quartet competitions in both Munich, Germany and Portsmouth, England.

In addition to their highly acclaimed performances of the standard repertoire in concerts from coast to coast, they are constantly involved in a wide range of projects that keep them on the cutting edge of chamber music in America. They have been Quartet-in-Residence of the innovative and exciting New York Chamber Ensemble. Their versatility is evident in highlights from recent seasons: performances in nearly all of New York's major recital halls including a recreation of Schoenberg's "Verein" concerts in a series at Lincoln Center's Alice Tully Hall and a concert with several noted jazz musicians at Carnegie Recital Hall, a complete Beethoven cycle, and live radio and television appearances. They are committed to performing and recording numerous contemporary and lesser known works of the chamber music repertoire. As exclusive quartet artists for the Koch International Classics label, they are involved in numerous compact disc recording projects which are being distributed worldwide.

Founded at the Eastman School of Music, they are Quartet-in-Residence and full-time faculty members of the Indiana University at South Bend. The Quartet also maintains a busy summer schedule of teaching and performance, having appeared at such prestigious festivals as Aspen, Newport, Grand Tetons, and Music Mountain. The Chester Quartet has performed with many internationally known solo artists as well as with members of the Guarneri and Cleveland Quartets. They have been heard numerous times on National Public Radio, the BBC, German State Radio, and have previously recorded for the CRI, Stolat, and Pantheon labels. Their management is Harry Beall.

The Quartet plays on a beautifully matched set of instruments consisting of a violin and cello by the create Cremonese maker Lorenzo Storioni (dated 1774 and 1794 respectively), a viola by his pupil Enrico Ceruti (c. 1879) and a violin by Michele Deconet (1754) made in Venice.

## 1991 String Jury



Lydia Artymiw, piano

Awarded the 1987 Avery Fisher Career Grant and the 1989 Andrew Wolf Chamber Music Prize, Philadelphia-born Lydia Artymiw has emerged as one of the most striking talents among pianists of her generation. She has performed with over eighty orchestras throughout the U. S., Europe, and the Far East with many of the leading conductors of our time. American orchestral appearances have included the Boston Symphony, Philadelphia Orchestra, Cleveland Orchestra, New York Philharmonic, Los Angeles Philharmonic, National Symphony, and the orchestras of Cincinnati, Detroit, Pittsburgh, Minnesota, St. Louis, and San Francisco. Solo recital tours have taken her to all of the major American citics, to important European music centers such as London, Paris, Milan, Berlin, and throughout the Far East. Critics have acclaimed her seven recordings for the prestigious Chandos label. Festival appearances include Aspen, Caramoor, Marlboro, Mostly Mozart, and the Hollywood Bowl. In chamber music she has collaborated with such artists as Yo-Yo-Ma, Arnold Steinhardt, Benita Valente, the Guarneri and Vermeer Quartets, and she has toured with Music From Marlboro. A recipient of top prizes in the 1976 Leventritt and the 1978 Leeds International Competitions, she studied with Gary Graffman for ten years.



Andor Toth, cello

Andor Toth has appeared throughout the world in recitals both on the stage and on radio and television. He has appeared as a soloist with many orchestras, among them the Houston Symphony, San Francisco Symphony, and The Civic Center Joffrey Ballet, and has worked with such important conductors as Andre Previn, Seiji Ozawa, Joseph Kripps, Lorin Maazel, and Rafael Kubelik. As a chamber musician, Toth was the cellist of the New Hungarian Quartet which toured regularly on four continents, and since 1982 has been the cellist of The Oberlin Trio, with Naumburg award winners Stephen Clapp and Joseph Schwartz. Throughout his career, Andor Toth has become identified with the middle-European, romantic school of cello playing, bringing to the public a clear aural vision of structure in the music he plays, while channeling the emotional character of that music into the hearts of his listeners. Mr. Toth has recorded a vast and varied repertoire for such labels as Angelicum, Golden Crest, and Vox. He appears on many compact disc recordings for AMPLITUDE. Mr. Toth entered the Oberlin Conservatory in 1965 as a pupil of George Neikrug. From 1972 to the present, Toth has been on the faculty of the Oberlin Conservatory of Music, where he is currently Professor of Chamber Music and Cello. Mr. Toth is regularly in demand for masterclasses, and has recently given masterclasses at such prestigious institutions as Rice University, Indiana University, Carleton College, and Stanford University.



Karen Tuttle, viola

Miss Tuttle first toured the United States as a violin virtuoso at age 16. She later studied viola at The Curtis Institute of Music with William Primrose and, at age 25, became a member of the Curtis faculty teaching viola and chamber music. In 1955 she performed and studied chamber music with Pablo Casals at the Prades Festival. In 1958. Miss Tuttle introduced the viola to native audiences in the villages of Fiji, Samoa and Tahiti. She made her Carnegie Recital Hall debut in 1960. Former member of the Schneider, the Galimir and the Gotham String Quartets, Miss Tuttle is now a member of New York Philomusica, a chamber music group in New York. Miss Tuttle has taught master classes and chamber music classes and has performed extensively in Canada and the U.S. She is currently on the faculty of Juilliard and is in residence as a performer and as a viola and chamber music instructor at the Aspen Music Festival. She also teaches in the summer at Banff Centre. Miss Tuttle first joined the faculty of the Curtis Institute of Music in 1944.

#### Toby Hanks, tuba

Toby Hanks has been principal tubaist with the San Antonio, Puerto Rico and Minneapolis (now Minnesota Orchestra) symphonies as well as the Casals Festival Orchestra. In addition to being principal tuba with the New York City Ballet Orchestra and the Chautauqua Symphony for many years, he has held the same position with the American Composers Orchestra since its inception and has toured and recorded extensively throughout the U.S., Canada and Europe with the New York Brass Quintet. He was a founding member of the New York Tuba Quartet and as a major free lance player in New York City has done countless concerts and/or recordings with practically every major New York ensemble. His solo album, Sampler, on Crystal Records, has been received with acclaim. Mr. Hanks holds faculty positions at the New England Conservatory, Manhattan School of Music and Yale University where he teaches tuba, coaches chamber music and conducts wind and brass ensembles.



#### Michael Hatfield, horn

Michael Hatfield became Professor of Horn at the Indiana University School of Music in 1984. For twenty-three years prior, he was the Principal Horn of the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra and Professor of Horn at the College-Conservatory of Music of the University of Cincinnati. For fifteen years he was a member of the Cincinnati Woodwind Quintet whose members were principal players from the Cincinnati Symphony. He continues his teaching in Cincinnati. Mr. Hatfield has been on the faculty of the Aspen Music School for sixteen seasons and performed as Associate Principal Horn of the Aspen Festival Orchestra and Principal Horn of the Santa Fe Opera in 1989. In 1983 he was a soloist and clinician at the International Horn Society Workshop and returned as a performer in 1985. He is active as a clinician in workshops throughout the Mid-West and is a faculty participant of the Grand Teton Festival Orchestra Seminar. Mr. Hatfield is listed in Who's Who in Music the 8th Edition. His teachers have been Verne Reynolds, Christopher Leuba and Philip Farkas.



#### Donald MacCourt, bassoon

Donald MacCourt is the bassoonist of the New York Woodwind Quintet and Speculum Musicae, as well as principal bassoonist at the New York City Ballet and a member of the New York Chamber Symphony. He was formerly a member of the Contemporary Chamber Ensemble, the Group for Contemporary Music at Columbia University, the Symphony of the Air, the National Symphony (Washington, D.C.), and the American Symphony. He has participated in the Marlboro, Norfolk, Waterloo, Newport, and Kuhmo (Finland) festivals and has been heavily involved in the performance and recording of chamber music, especially twentieth century chamber music for many years. He can be heard with the Contemporary Chamber Ensemble, the Group for Contemporary Music, Speculum Musicae, the New York Woodwind Quintet and as a soloist on the Nonesuch, CRI, New World, Vox, Desto, Marlboro, and Columbia labels. Mr. MacCourt is on the faculty of the Juilliard School, the SUNY College at Purchase and, in the summers, the Tanglewood Music Center.

### **Commentary on the Competition**

By Dea Jean Andrews

Music competitions - the Van Cliburn, the Tschaikovsky, the Casadeus - have lifted many gifted musicians into prominence and given direction to their careers. However, most of these competitions are for solo performances; few are for ensembles.

Joseph Fischoff and the members of the South Bend Chamber Music Society recognized the need for a forum where young aspiring chamber musicians would be encouraged to pursue their art and where promising ensembles could be identified. In 1974, they established a competition and six groups participated. They may not have known how successful their endeavors would be, but today there is no doubt that they founded a "winner."

Not only did the number of applicant groups increase to nearly seventy by 1988, but also winners of the competition went on to distinguish themselves. Groups such as the Meliora, the Ridge, and the Franciscan String Quartets have all won top prizes at other important competitions and have gone on to successful careers on the concert stage. The 1987 winners, the Harrington String Quartet, recently made their Carnegie Recital Hall debut in New York City. The 1988 winners, the Lafayette String Quartet, placed third in the prestigious City of Portsmouth (England) International String Quartet Competition.

The Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition has indeed grown in status and reputation; however, it has not lost sight of the goal of encouraging young musicians. To give the youngest players a fair chance, there is a Junior Division. The Kenneth Geoffroy Award was established for the best regional (Michiana) junior ensemble. All groups are juried by six well known and respected string and wind musicians. For three days, these men and women listen with care and concentration to the contestant groups and make their selections. They do this knowing full well that besides mastery of instruments, and musical and ensemble cohesiveness, there is an element in their decisions that is not quantifiable - taste and musical preference. It is a tribute to past adjudicators that their decisions have helped solidify the reputation of the Fischoff Competition.

From 1979 to 1984, the Competition was organized and run by Century Productions. Under the strain of an incredible growth, it became apparent that an independent organization was needed which made its sole responsibility the running of the competition. In 1985, the Fischoff Chamber Music Association was incorporated as a not-for-profit organization. It is governed by a board of directors and managed by an executive director with an assistant. Now that the Association has established itself in the centrally located Colfax Cultural Center and has achieved efficiency in running its organization, it has identified three additional objectives for growth. It aims to increase the amount of prize money for each category; to extend the Winner's Tour by including a concert in a major hall in New York City; and to focus on the stated purpose of stimulating the appreciation of chamber music among residents of Michiana.

South Bend is fortunate to be the home of such an important competition whose increasing degree of artistic quality and professional excellence has garnered the respect of the music world.

## How the Jury Picks the Winner

How does a juror make his or her selection of the very best ensemble? It is no easy task by any means. The distinguished jury of the 1991 Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition will have some formulas to help them. However, they will primarily rely upon their own musical excellence and experience as performers and teachers when they listen for : Interpretation (tempi, dynamics, musicality, etc.); Ensemble (balance, blend, unity of playing, etc.); Technical Accuracy (rhythm, intonation, etc.); Overall Performance (poise, artistic impression, etc.).

Each juror ranks all of the ensembles (within each category) from one - being best, to the last ensemble. Then, members of the Competition Committee and staff list each of the juror's rankings for each ensemble. Each ensemble's set of rankings is then added and averaged to obtain the composite rank for each group.

Rankings may be a great way for determining who wins the prize but, the real value for the musicians comes from the written comments which the jurors make about each performance. The jury's comment sheets are distributed to each ensemble after the competition is finished. By reading these comments, all of the ensembles win valuable, positive feedback which encourages their growth as chamber musicians.

## **Summary of Competition Rules**

The Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition is open to chamber music ensembles of three to five instrumentalists. It is divided into two Divisions: Junior & Senior. The Senior Division is divided into two Categories: Wind & String. Junior Division ensembles must not include members who are older than age 18. For Senior Division ensembles, the average of the members' ages must not exceed 30 years.

There are minimum repertoire requirements in both the Senior and Junior Divisions. Junior ensembles must be prepared to play a minimum of two contrasting movements (they may or may not be from the same piece) which comprise a minimum of ten minutes total playing time.

Senior Division ensembles must prepare a minimum of two complete works of contrasting style and period, comprising a minimum of 40 minutes total playing time. Appropriateness of repertoire is subject to the approval of the Competition Committee.

The Competition takes place in three rounds. The first round is a tape audition which is screened by a panel of qualified musician performer/teachers. The second and third rounds are the live auditions held in South Bend before the panel of distinguished jurors.

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

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
