

A MEMORIAL TRIBUTE



Joe Fischoff loved music, especially chamber music. I have never met anyone who loved it more. He played chamber music, especially string quartets, in his home every week for as long as he could continue to play. Joe and his friends began the South Bend Chamber Music Society, which eventually led to the formation of the Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition. He was in the furniture business by trade, but was a musician at heart.

There never was a better audience member than Joe. Being at a concert was a great event for him. I have never met anyone who loved it more. And, knowing that Joe was out there in the audience gave me and my performing colleagues extra inspiration to play our hearts out because we knew that it would mean so much to at least one member of the audience. . .him! His beaming smile of joy could literally be felt by performers on stage, as could the tears of sadness during particularly moving slow movements like the Cavatina from Beethoven's Opus 130.

Joe loved to encourage young people to continue the art of chamber music. I have never met anyone to whom this was more important. As the Competition grew, and the temptation to become just like all other competitions also grew, Joe would continually remind us of our roots in education. He quietly insisted that this competition had to be different. It became a goal for it to be a positive and constructive experience for all musicians who came to South Bend to take part in the Competition. Because of him, this competition not only seeks out excellence, but has as its major goal to stimulate and educate as many people as possible to be chamber musicians, to listen to chamber music, and most of all, to love chamber music. Chamber Music America recognized his contributions by presenting him with its Lifetime Service Award.

We all will miss Joe. We will miss his warmth, love, dedication, friendship, and inspiration. Together, he and his wife Midge have shown the warmth and compassion which has pervaded the spirit of this organization named in his honor. We will miss him, but never forget him.

He lived a great life that positively affected this world and many, many people. I have never met anyone who has done it better.

Through their contribution of time and attention to the needs of the musicians, they have shaped the Competition into the smooth running event that it is. The Fischoff Association acknowledges with deep gratitude the everyone who has volunteered to fill the 100 or so time slots involved in the operation of the Competition. Thank you all very much!!

How the Jury Picks the Winner

How does a juror make his or her selection of the very best ensemble? It is no easy task by any means. The distinguished jury of the 1992 Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition will have some formulas to help them. However, they will primarily rely upon their own musical excellence and experience as performers and teachers when they listen for : Interpretation (tempi, dynamics, musicality, etc.); Ensemble (balance, blend, unity of playing, etc.); Technical Accuracy (rhythm, intonation, etc.); Overall Performance (poise, artistic impression, etc.).

Each juror ranks all of the ensembles (within each category) from one - being best, to the last ensemble. Then, members of the Competition Committee and staff list each of the juror's rankings for each ensemble. Each ensemble's set of rankings is then added and averaged to obtain the composite rank for each group.

Rankings may be a great way for determining who wins the prize but, the real value for the musicians comes from the written comments which the jurors make about each performance. The jury's comment sheets are distributed to each ensemble after the competition is finished. By reading these comments, all of the ensembles win valuable, positive feedback which encourages their growth as chamber musicians.

Summary of Competition Rules

The Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition is open to chamber music ensembles of three to five instrumentalists. It is divided into two Divisions: Junior & Senior. The Senior Division is divided into two Categories: Wind & String. Junior Division ensembles must not include members who are older than age 18. For Senior Division ensembles, the average of the members' ages must not exceed 30 years.

There are minimum repertoire requirements in both the Senior and Junior Divisions. Junior ensembles must be prepared to play a minimum of two contrasting movements (they may or may not be from the same piece) which comprise a minimum of ten minutes total playing time.

Senior Division ensembles must prepare a minimum of two complete works of contrasting style and period, comprising a minimum of 40 minutes total playing time. Appropriateness of repertoire is subject to the approval of the Competition Committee.

The Competition takes place in three rounds. The first round is a tape audition which is screened by a panel of qualified musician performer/teachers. The second and third rounds are the live auditions held in South Bend before the panel of distinguished jurors.



Robert Biddlecome, trombone

Robert Biddlecome, bass trombonist, is a faculty member of the Juilliard School and the Aspen Music School and is also Executive Director of the American Brass Chamber Music Association. He is an active performing musician and member of the New York City Ballet Orchestra, the American Symphony Orchestra, the American Composers Orchestra and has performed as bass trombonist of the Aspen Festival Orchestra since 1970, where he is also Orchestra Manager. For 28 years he performed throughout the world as a member of the American Brass Ouintet and can be heard on more than 30 recordings with that ensemble. Also an accomplished performer on the euphonium, he was solo euphonium with both the US Army Band and Goldman Band. Mr. Biddlecome served for many years as a board member of Chamber Music America and as a board member and president of the American Symphony Orchestra. His principal teachers were Simone Mantia and Roger Smith. Mr. Biddlecome is a graduate of the Juilliard School where he received both a bachelors and a masters degree.



Donald Sinta, saxophone

Donald Sinta is widely recognized as one of the world's most gifted wind soloists. He has gained international respect from his peers both as performer and teacher. After a tour of Russia as featured soloist with the University of Michigan Band, Sinta became a classroom music instructor in the East Detroit public schools. A year later, he became the first instructor of saxophone at the Ithaca College School of Music. He later taught at the Hartt School of Music in Connecticut and in 1974 assumed his current position as professor of saxophone at the University of Michigan School of Music. Having performed in nearly all of the fifty states, he has commissioned over thirty works by the world's leading composers, including two Pulitzer Prize winners. His influence as a teacher is great: nearly three-quarters of the saxophonists listed in Musical America are past students. On the occasion of the first World Saxophone Congress in Chicago, Sinta was elected president.



Judith Mendenhall, flute

Judith Mendenhall is principal flute of the New York Chamber Symphony under Gerard Schwarz. She has appeared throughout the United States and Europe as recitalist, chamber musician, and orchestral soloist. Ms. Mendenhall has been presented in solo recitals at the 92nd Street Y, the Metropolitan Museum, and the Schubert Club. She has appeared in twelve nationwide "Music from Marlboro" tours, and has been guest artist with the Cleveland, Concord, Emerson, and Mendelssohn String Quartets, the Chamber Music Society of Marlboro, Spoleto USA Festival, and the Grand Teton Music Festival. She is on the roster of Affiliate Artists, the faculty of the Mannes College, and has recorded for Columbia, CRI, Vox, Delos, and the Marlboro Recording Society.

Mr. Dawes studied violin in Canada, the USA and Europe and was a prizewinner in national and international competitions. He is one of the founding members of the Orford Quartet and was first violinist for 26 years. The quartet performed nearly 2,000 concerts in North and South America, Eastern and Western Europe, the Soviet Union, North Africa, Australia, New Zealand, Japan and Hong Kong. They made over 50 recordings; three of which have won Juno Awards. The Quartet won first prize in the European Broadcasting Union's International String Quartet Competition (1974), two Grand Prix du Disque-Canada, and in 1986, was named Ensemble of the Year by the Canadian Music Council. Andrew was an Assoc. Prof. at the Univ. of Toronto where he taught violin and chamber music for 20 years. In 1970, he and his colleagues founded the Kelso Music Centre, a successful quartet camp which ran for four weeks every year until 1974. The Orford Quartet initiated a unique national residency program in which Dawes and his colleagues performed and taught at music schools in Canada, the US and Europe. He has been a member of the jury of the Banff International String Quartet Competition since its inception in 1983, and was invited by Sir Yehudi Menuhin to be on the jury of the London International String Quartet Competition in 1991 where he performed a Vivaldi Violin Concerto with Sir Yehudi. In 1991, he was awarded a Canada Council grant to study chamber music in North America and Europe.



Zeyda Ruga Suzuki, piano

Music is pianist Zeyda Ruga Suzuki's first language. At the age of three, she learned to read music before she learned to read Spanish in her native Cuba. Married to Japanese violinist and concertmaster of the Indianapolis Symphony, Hidetaro Suzuki, the Suzuki Duo has toured Asia, Europe, the Soviet Union and North America extensively for the past thirty concert seasons. In addition to her impressive career as a soloist appearing with major orchestras and festivals internationally, Mrs. Suzuki is extremely active in chamber music. A resident of Indianapolis since 1979, Zeyda has presented numerous chamber music works in the popular series she and her husband founded: "Suzuki and Friends." She has presented the Piano & Violin Sonatas and Piano Trios of Beethoven and Brahms, as well as the Bach Brandenburg Concerti in which she debuted as harpsichordist. She has appeared in the Indianapolis Museum of Art's Mozart Series, and several piano recitals. She is a much sought after collaborator by international artists such as Elmar Oliveira, Colin Carr, Yehuda Hanani, Michael Parloff, Philip Myers, Sylvia McNair and the Chester String Quartet. Zeyda holds diplomas from Havana's Municipal Conservatory and the Curtis Institute (where she was a pupil of Rudolf Serkin). She earned her doctorate at Laval University in Quebec where she also taught as Assoc. Prof. of Chamber Music and headed the chamber music department from 1971 -1979. She was Visiting Prof. of Piano at IUSB for the 1990-1991 academic year.



Steven Tenenborn, viola

In great demand as a chamber musician, violist Steven Tenenbom has appeared as guest artist with such eminent ensembles as the Guarneri and Emerson String Quartets, the Kalichstein-Laredo-Robinson and Beaux Arts Trios, the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center and for Chamber Music at the Y. He has appeared as soloist with the Rochester Philharmonic and the Brandenburg Ensemble for performances in Boston's Symphony Hall, the Kennedy Center, and Avery Fisher Hall, and on tour in Japan. Mr. Tenenbom has also performed with the Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra, as member and soloist with the Concerto Soloists of Philadelphia, with the Manhattan String Quartet, the Guadagnini String Trio, and for Bargemusic, New York. A member of the prestigious groups TASHI and the Galimir String Quartet, Mr. Tenenbom has collaborated with such diverse composers as Lukas Foss and jazz artist Chick Corea. He has had a long association with the Marlboro Music Festival, including many tours across the US, Japan, and France. Other festivals include the June Music Festival, Mostly Mozart, Chamber Music West, Music from Angel Fire, and Bravo! Colorado. He is on the faculties of Mannes College of Music and the Hartt School of Music. He was on the faculties of SUNY/Purchase and the St. Louis Conservatory of Music. Mr. Tenenbom has recorded on the RCA Records, Sony Classical, Marlboro Recording Society, Delos, and ECM labels. He studied with Max Mandel, Milton Thomas, Michael Tree and Karen Tuttle.
