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


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SUMMARY OF COMPETITION RULES

The Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition is open to any wind, brass, or string chamber music ensemble of three to six members. The Competition is divided into two divisions --junior and senior. A junior division ensemble may not include a member who exceeds age 18 as of the Competition dates. The average age of senior ensemble entrants cannot exceed age 30. Further, the senior division is divided into two categories -- wind and string. The Artistic Director places mixed ensembles into one of the two categories.

The groups must fulfill minimum repertoire requirements. Junior ensembles must prepare two contrasting movements, which may or may not be from the same composition, and which comprise a minimum of ten minutes' playing time. Senior ensembles must prepare at least two com-

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plete works of contrasting period and style that comprise a minimum of 40 minutes playing time. Appropriateness of repertoire is subject to approval by the Artistic Committee.

The Competition takes place in three rounds. The first round, in which the repertoire rules apply, is a blind tape screening conducted by a panel of qualified performers and/or instructors. The semi-final and final rounds occur as live auditions in South Bend before a panel of distinguished jurors. The jurors decide which pieces or movements will be played by each ensemble prior to performance.

HOW THE JURY PICKS THE WINNER

How does a juror make his or her selection of the "best" ensemble from all the competitors? It can be a Herculean task. The distinguished jurors of the 1995 Competition do have some formulas on which they can rely. However, their decisions are guided primarily by their own musical integrity and experience as performers and instructors when they listen for the following items: interpretation -- tempi and dynamics; ensemble performance -- balance within the ensemble, blend, and unity of the members; technical accuracy -- rhythm and intonation; overall performance -- poise, artistic impression, and expression.

Each juror ranks the ensembles in each division catagory from the top ensemble to the bottom one. The Artistic Committee and Staff average all the jurors' rankings for each ensemble to arrive at a composite ranking.

Rankings may be a good method for determining the prize winners, but the real value for these young

musicians comes from the written commentary concerning their performances they receive from the jurors. The jury's comments are distributed to all performing ensembles at the completion of the Competition. From these written comments, all the musicians gain valuable and constructive feedback, which provides a springboard for their growth as artists and ensembles.

I was quite impressed with the amount of volume, not just fortissimo but pianissimo, achieved upon immediate demand. It may take a bit of adjustment, especially on A string, as with such responsive strings, there is certainly no need to press/force the tone. I truly enjoy this aspect. It allows a much freer tone and ease of playing once this minor adjustment is made."



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
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ANDREW JENNINGS

Violinist Andrew Jennings was graduated from the Juilliard School where he studied with Ivan Galamian and the Juilliard Quartet. In 1970 he formed the Concord String Quartet which won the prestigious Naumburg Chamber Music Award in 1971. The Ouartet went on to become one of America's leading chamber ensembles. In over 1200 worldwide concerts, the Concord Quartet played in most major cities in the U.S. and Europe. Its two dozen recordings for the RCA, Nonesuch, and Vox labels were awarded many prizes including Grammy recognition. The Quartet twice received Emmy awards for television appearances.

After leaving the Quartet, Mr. Jennings became the violinist of the Gabrielli Trio and was appointed Associate Professor of Violin at the University of Michigan in 1992. He continues to serve on the faculties of Oberlin College, the Greenwood Music School in Massachusetts, and the Tanglewood Music Center - summer home of the Boston Symphony Orchestra.


His booklet, So You Want to be a Violinist? - A Guide for High School Musicians, has been published by Shar Products.

Mr. Jennings and his family, all of whom are accomplished musicians, have begun giving concerts together and were named "Ohio Musical Family of the Year" in 1992 by the Governor and the American Federation of Music Clubs.



JEFFREY IRVINE

Jeffrey Irvine, violist, is Professor of Viola at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music and was formerly violist of the New World String Quartet and the Carmel Quartet. He is known as both a soloist and a chamber musician and has taught at some of this country's most renowned schools of music. As a member of the New World String Quartet, Mr. Irvine has performed throughout the United States and Europe, including concerts at Carnegie Recital Hall and the Kennedy Center. From 1981 to 1991 he appeared regularly in the chamber music concerts of the Aspen Music Festival and in its Fromm Week of new Music. As a member of the Aspen Contemporary Ensemble, he has recorded for New World Records. Mr. Irvine was the Principal Violist of the Wichita Symphony from 1977 to 1981 and also has a been a member of the Aspen Festival Orchestra and Chamber Symphony.A member of the Oberlin Conservatory faculty since 1983, he also was a member of the Aspen Music Festival faculty from 1981 to 1991. He taught at the Meadowmount School of Music for two summers and has been on the faculty of The Quartet Program since the summer of 1992. He has taught at the Eastman School of Music and Wichita State University and has given master classes at the University of Michigan, Eastman School of Music, and throughout China. Mr. Irvine received his Bachelor of Music degree from the Philadelphia Musical Academy and his Master of Music degree from the Eastman School of Music.



JOHN OWINGS

John Owings made his orchestral debut with the San Antonio Symphony at the age of fifteen. He has performed with major American orchestras, including the Cleveland Orchestra, the Chicago, Dallas, Denver, Houston and National Symphonies, and the Boston Pops. He has given recitals in such major cities as New York, London, Paris, Brussels, Chicago, Washington, D.C., Warsaw, Tokyo, Beijing, and Shanghai. His radio performances have included CBC Television and Radio in Canada, NPR and APR in the United States, BBC in Great Britain, and Radio France.

The recipient of many prestigious awards and prizes, Mr. Owings won first prize in the 1975 Robert Casadesus International Piano Competition in Cleveland and was a member of the jury for that competition in 1983 and 1991. Other first prize honors include the 1968 London Liszt Society Competition and the 1980 Musical Arts Competition in Chicago.

Mr. Owings studied at the Royal College of Music in London as a Fulbright Scholar. Later, his studies took him to Switzerland, Italy and the Juilliard School, where he received the Master's degree. He teachers have included Dalies Frantz, Rosina Lhevinne, Martin Canin, Karl Leifheit, GezaAnda, and Wilhelm Kempff.

Formerly on the faculties of the Oberlin Conservatory and Indiana University South Bend, he currently is Professor of Piano and Coordinator of Piano Studies at Texas Christian University.



CAROL WINCENC

A frequent guest of the major orchestras and festivals throughout the United States, Ms. Wincenc has appeared with the Saint Louis, Atlanta, Indianapolis, Houston, and Seattle symphonies; the Buffalo Philharmonic; the Los Angeles and Saint Paul chamber orchestras; and the Mostly Mozart, Santa Fe, Spoleto, Caramoor and Marlboro music festivals. Equally in demand abroad, Ms. Wincenc has given acclaimed performances with the London Symphony, the English and Stuttgart chamber orchestras, and at numerous international festivals.

Committed to expanding the flute repertoire, Ms. Wincenc has commissioned concertos from Lukas Foss, Joan Tower, Pulitzer Prize winner Christopher Rouse, Henryk Gorecki and Tobias Picker..

In great demand as a chamber musician, Ms. Wincenc has collaborated with the Guarneri, Emerson, Tokyo and Cleveland string quartets and performed with colleagues Jessye Norman, Emanuel Ax, Yo-Yo Ma, and Elly Ameling.

Equally active as a recording artist, Carol Wincenc can be heard on Nonesuch with pianist Samuel Sanders and composers/pianists David Del Tredici and Lukas Foss in music by American composers, and on the Deutsche Grammophon label with the Emerson String Quartet in the complete flute quartets of Mozart.

Carol Wincenc presently is a Professor of Flute at the Juilliard School of Music in New York.



W. PETER KURAU

W. Peter Kurau holds appointments as an Associate Professor of Horn and Chamber Music at the Eastman School and hornist with the Eastman Brass, Assistant Principal Horn of the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra, and as a member of the faculties (adjunct) of SUNY-Geneseo, Nazareth College, and Roberts Wesleyan College. Currently a member of the Advisory Council of the International Horn Society, Mr. Kurau serves as its scholarship committee chairman and as Pedagogy Editor for the Horn Call. He previously served on the faculty of the University of Missouri-Columbia and as a member of the St. Louis Symphony. A prizewinner in the Heldenleben International Horn Competition and a recipient of an I.T.T. International Fellowship and seven faculty merit and development awards, he is also active as a soloist, chamber musician, and clinician for United Musical Instruments (Conn/King), and has appeared in these capacities at various conventions. He has been active in commissioning and premiering new works for horn, including compositions by noted American composers Vern Reynolds, John Cheetham, and James Willey. He received his formal musical education at the Eastman School, Guildhall School of Music and Drama, Royal College of Music, University of Connecticut, and Florida State University. His principal teachers were Verne Reynolds, David Cripps and William Capps. In 1991, he premiered the recently discovered and reconstructed version of Mozart's Rondo, K.371 for horn and orchestra.



ALLAN DEAN






