





Ann Divine, Executive Director, began her work with the Fischoff Association as Competition Manager in 1994. She was appointed Executive Director shortly after the completion of the 1994 Competition. Ms. Divine received her undergraduate degree in Music Education from Indiana University South Bend, and her Master of Arts degree in Music History from Andrews University. She has taught at IUSB and other area colleges for more than twenty years.

Ms. Divine is a member of the South Bend Chamber singers, a 28-voice ensemble specializing in 20th Century music. Most recently she was appointed to the Community Advisory Council of WNIT Public Television.

Thomas Rosenberg is nationally known as a dynamic teacher, chamber music coach, and performer. A resident of Saint Paul, Minnesota, he is cellist of the Artaria String Quartet with whom he concertizes, records and presents numerous educational workshops. He is a faculty member of Macalester College, Carleton College and the University of Minnesota, and also maintains a busy private studio of cellists and chamber ensembles. During the summers he teaches and coaches at music centers such as The Quartet Program at Bucknell where he has also been Associate Director, the Tanglewood Institute, Bravo, and the Stringwood, of which he is co-founder. Since 1981, Tom has been Artistic Director of the prestigious Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition and has been named "Arts Educator of the Year" by the Michiana Arts and Sciences Council. He has received top chamber music prizes at the Munich (Germany), Portsmouth (England), and Chicago Discovery Competitions, and is a three-time Naumburg Award finalist. He has been solo cello of the New York Chamber Ensemble and appeared at many music festivals including Aspen, Newport, Banff, South Mountain, Cape May, the Grand Tetons, and the International Music Festival in San Jose, Costa Rica. Previously, he was Associate Professor of Cello at Indiana University South Bend and a founding member of the highly acclaimed Chester String Quartet with whom he made numerous recordings and for twenty years appeared on concert stages and live radio coast to coast in the United States, Canada, Central America, and Europe. Tom is a graduate of Oberlin and the Eastman School of Music where he was teaching assistant to both Paul Katz and Laurence Lesser. Other teachers include Richard Kapuscinski, Alan Harris, Alta Mayer, and for chamber music, members of the Budapest, Juilliard, Tokyo, Guarneri, and Cleveland quartets.



Miki Strabley joined Fischoff as Competition and Program Manager in August 2000. She received her Bachelor of Arts degrees in English Literature and Political Science at Saint Mary's College in Notre Dame, Indiana. In 2001, she completed her Master's of Science in Education. Ms. Strabley is certified to teach secondary English, English as a Second Language and government. She has taught English at St. Joseph's High School in South Bend, and

worked with special education students in Lynnwood, Washington. Outside interests include co-moderating the St. Joseph High School Mock Trial team and community volunteering. She plays the trumpet and is a member of the St. Matthew's Cathedral Brass and the University Band of Notre Dame.



Carrie Lehman, Quarterfinal Manager, was formerly Fischoff's Administrative Assistant from 1995-1997, while an undergraduate student at Indiana University South Bend. She graduated from Spring Arbor College, in 1999, with a Bachelor's degree in Business Administration, with a concentration in Finance and Management. She is currently employed as a Registered Representative with MFB Financial Corporation in their investment/trust department. Ms. Lehman enjoys piano and flute as an avocation.

Amanda VanHaute, Competition Assistant, is a 2001 graduate of Valparaiso University with a degree in Music Business. Ms. Van Haute was a Fischoff intern during the 2000 Competition. 



FISCHOFF'S ARTS-IN-EDUCATION RESIDENCY

In 2002-03 Fischoff presented its eighth annual Arts-in-Education Residency, inviting the Imani Winds and Chiara String Quartet to South Bend for two weeks of educational and community programming. Imani Winds, a professional woodwind quintet from New York City, arrived in South Bend for a week of events in October. Chiara, Gold Medal winners of the 2002 Competition String Division, presented a week of events in February. Imani and Chiara combined for over 30 memorable programs throughout the community.

Aimed at community outreach and young people in particular, the Residency reached more than 3,000 children and young adults. The purpose of the Residency is to support educational programs and performances, while encouraging development, awareness, and appreciation of the art of chamber music and its role in our culture. Fischoff has enjoyed the enthusiastic support of community organizations, agencies, foundations and schools since the inauguration of the Residency in 1995.








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THE 30TH ANNUAL COMPETITION

COMPETITION RULES

The Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition is open to any wind, brass, or string chamber music ensemble of three to six members. The Competition is divided into two divisions—junior and senior. Junior Division ensemble members must be age 18 or younger as of the Competition dates. The average age of Senior Division ensembles cannot exceed 30. Further, the Senior Division is divided into two categories—wind and string. The Artistic Director places mixed ensembles into one of the two categories.

The groups must fulfill minimum repertoire requirements. Junior ensembles must prepare two contrasting movements, which may or may not be from the same composition, and which comprise a minimum of ten minutes playing time. Senior ensembles must prepare at least two complete works of contrasting period and style that consist of a minimum of 40 minutes playing time.

The Competition takes place in several rounds. The first round, in which the repertoire rules apply, is a video tape screening conducted by a panel of qualified performers and/or instructors. The Junior Quarterfinal, Junior and Senior Semifinal, and Final rounds are live auditions in South Bend before a panel of distinguished jurors. Prior to performance, the jurors decide which pieces or movements will be played.

HOW THE JURY SELECTS THE WINNER

How does a juror make his or her selection of the "best" ensemble from all the competitors? It can be a Herculean task. The distinguished jurors of the 2003 Competition do have some formulas on which they can rely. However, their decisions are guided primarily by their own musical integrity and experience as performers and instructors. They listen for interpretation—tempi and dynamics; ensemble performance—balance within the ensemble, blend, and unity of the members; technical accuracy—rhythm and intonation; and overall performance—poise, artistic impression, and expression.

Jurors individually rank the ensembles in each division. These rankings are combined, then averaged for each ensemble to arrive at a group's composite ranking. Rankings are a good method for determining the prize winners, but the real value for these young musicians comes from the written comments of the jurors. The juror evaluations are distributed to all performing ensembles at the completion of the Competition. From these written comments, the musicians gain valuable and constructive feedback, which is intended to stimulate their growth as artists and ensembles.

Identifying conflict of interest issues is very important to the integrity of the competition. Conflicts of interest between jurors and ensembles or any individuals within an ensemble are carefully identified and handled appropriately.

Junior Quarterfinal Jurors

The Quarterfinal Round was introduced in 1996 to allow for increased applications to the Junior Division of the Fischoff Competition. This Round provides an additional day of competition and masterclasses. The Quarterfinal Round offers a valuable educational component for our youngest participants. From this group, six ensembles will be selected to compete in the Junior Semifinal on Saturday. Masterclasses, conducted by a separate panel of Quarterfinal jurors, will be offered Saturday morning. Fischoff is honored and pleased to welcome the following 2003 Quarterfinal jurors.

Zeyda Ruga Suzuki

Music is pianist Zeyda Ruga Suzuki's first language. At the age of three, she learned how to read music before she learned how to read Spanish in her native Cuba. She and her husband, violinist Hidetaro Suzuki, have enjoyed a magnificent global partnership, touring extensively in Japan, Canada, Europe, and the United States.

Ms. Ruga Suzuki has been artist-in residence at major festivals including the Stratford, Mont-Orford, Lac St. Jean, Bay Chamber Concerts, Grand Teton, Madeline Island, Steamboat Springs, River Run Vermont, and Peaceful Valley Music Festivals. Through collaborations with conductors such as Pierre Dervaux, Raymond Leppard, Hidetaro Suzuki, Kirk Trevor, Ling Tung, and David Wiley, she has performed as a soloist with orchestras in Havana, Quebec, Japan, Hong Kong, and the United States. Ms. Ruga Suzuki has recorded for Toshiba-EMI, Select-Canada and the CBC International. In Indianapolis, Ms. Ruga Suzuki performs regularly with the chamber music series "Suzuki & Friends." Her reputation as a consummate chamber musician is respected in Chicago as well After a guest appearance with the Rembrandt Chamber Players in 1993, and subsequent re-engagements, she has become a permanent member of the ensemble, performing regularly at Northwestern and DePaul Universities. An advocate of contemporary music, Zeyda Ruga Suzuki has played world premieres of works written for her by American composers James Aikman, Jon Deak, and Hsueh-Yung Shen

This season, she will tour Japan in December with Indianapolis Symphony concertmaster Hidetaro Suzuki, and perform recitals with cellist Sharon Robinson.



Mimi Zweig

Ms. Zweig is Professor of Violin and Viola at Indiana University and Director of the Indiana University String Academy. Since 1972, she has developed children's string programs across the United States. Her students have won numerous competitions and are performing as soloists, playing in orchestras, and teaching throughout the

world. She has also given master classes in North America, Europe and Mexico. Previously, Ms. Zweig was Director of the String Academy of Wisconsin at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, Assistant Principal Viola of the Indianapolis Symphony, and a member of the American Symphony and the Syracuse Symphony.

Diane Monroe

Diane Monroe is an internationally acclaimed violinist whose performances range from classical repertoire to traditional jazz. Ms. Monroe had the honor of appearing at the very first Fiddlefest, at Carnegie Hall. Her rich rendering of Stravinsky's Fairy's Kiss and her amazing unaccompanied version of Amazing Grace won her instant acclaim.

Her initial Fiddlefest success led to appearances in Alan Miller's documentary film, Small Wonders, and the recent Meryl Streep film, Music of the Heart. Diane Monroe is frequently heard at such renowned venues as the Marlboro, Caramoor, Sitka, Verbier, North Sea Jazz, and Mellon Jazz festivals. She has appeared in concert with Yo-Yo Ma, performing the string quartets of Henry Cowell at BAM, and as guest soloist in both Wall to Wall presentations of Kurt Weil and Irving Berlin at Symphony Space in New York City.

An advocate of new music, Ms. Monroe is frequently called upon by composers to premiere their works. David Baker, Anthony Davis, Julia Wolfe, Steven Dembsky, Joseph Nocella, Leslie Burrs, and Robert Moran have all had their solo works premiered and repeated by her.

Monroe has worked with great chamber music masters such as Karen Tuttle, Josef Gingold, Felix Galimir, Mischa Schneider, Julius Levine, and members of the Guarneri and Cleveland Quartets.

Monroe currently teaches at Temple University and Swarthmore College. Her distinguished awards include the 2002 Distinguished Alumni Award from the University of the Arts, the Pro Musicis Foundation Recitalist Award, The Alan and Wendy Pesky Award, and two Grants from Meet-the-Composer.




Rex Martin

Professor of Music at Northwestern University, Rex Martin is one of the world's finest tubists and brass pedagogues. Before joining the faculty at Northwestern University, Martin had been a faculty member at the Oberlin Conservatory, Illinois State University, DePaul University, the University of Notre Dame, The Vandercook College of Music and the University of Illinois at Chicago. Martin was host of the 1995 International Tuba-Euphonium Conference. A graduate of Illinois State University and Northwestern University, Martin received Illinois State's "Outstanding Alumni" award in 1999.

Semifinal Jurors



Eugene Rousseau has performed across North America and on five continents since his Carnegie Hall debut. He gave the first solo saxophone recitals in Paris, Berlin, Vienna, London and Amsterdam and has premiered numerous works written for him, including the Partita by Juan Orrego-Salas (with the Haydn Trio of Vienna), Jindrich Feld's Sonata for alto saxophone and piano, and Concerto for saxophones and orchestra. Rousseau has given a yearly master course at the prestigious Mozarteum in Salzburg since 1991, the first year the saxophone was included.

Rousseau has appeared with the Minnesota Orchestra under Leonard Slatkin, the Pan-American Festival Orchestra under Lukas Foss, the Indianapolis Symphony under Raymond Leppard and Phillipe Entremont, the BBC Orchestra in London, the Janácek Philharmonic (Czech Republic), the Kansai Philharmonic (Osaka), and the Santiago Philharmonic (Chile). The Chicago-born Rousseau's service to the saxophone community is long standing. Since 1972, he has been the Yamaha Corporation's chief consultant for saxophone research, contributing to the development of acoustic improvements in saxophones and mouthpieces. Rousseau co-founded the World Saxophone Congress in 1969 and has been President of both the North American Saxophone Alliance and the Comité International du Saxophone. He holds the title of Distinguished Professor of Music at Indiana University, having served on the IU faculty from 1964 to 2000 In 1993, Eugene Rousseau was designated an honorary faculty member of the Prague Conservatory. In 2003, Rousseau and the University of Minnesota School of Music will host the 13th World Saxophone Congress Convention.



Robert Shannon has been Professor of Piano at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music since 1976. He has performed and given master classes in Europe, South America, Asia, and throughout the United States. A continuing series of recordings for Bridge Records has been widely praised in the world press.

Mr. Shannon is the Director of the Oberlin Summer Piano Festival and Competition. This unique event combines master classes and concerts by Oberlin professors and special guest faculties, lectures by prominent musicologists (this year devoted to Schubert) and an international competition for high school students. Mr. Shannon also often serves as a judge of various American competitions such as the Cleveland International Piano Competition and the Concert Artists Guild of New York Competition.

Mr. Shannon's repertoire ranges from Bach to Boulez, but he has been particularly noted for his performances of twentieth century American composers. He has commissioned and premiered works by John Harbison, Charles Wuorinen, Tod Machover and Donald Erb, among others. His recordings of solo and violin sonatas of Charles Ives (with long-time duo partner Gregory Fulkerson) have received rave reviews. He has recently become involved in expanding the repertoire for Disklavier interfaced with other media, which represents a whole new gamut of sounds and textural possibilities for a single performer.

In recent seasons, Mr. Shannon has performed in London, Hamburg, Stuttgart, Caracas, Taiwan, Houston, San Francisco, Milwaukee and Los Angeles as soloist and in duo recitals with his wife and faculty colleague, Haewon Song.




Michael Reynolds, violoncellist, began his career as the founding cellist of the Muir String Quartet. In that capacity, he tours the musical centers of North America and Europe annually, in addition to his activities as professor at Boston University, where he has been in residence since 1983. A native of Montana. he received his professional training at the Curtis Institute of Music, where he was a student of David Soyer and Martita Casals. Upon graduation, he continued his studies with Karen Tuttle and George Neikrug and attended Yale University. Accolades he has received while with the Muir Quartet include first prize at the Evian Competition (1980), the 1981 Naumburg Award, two Grand Prix du Diques (1985, 1987), the Gramophone Award (1987), a Grammy nomination and a Grammy Award through the EcoClassics recording label, and an internationally acclaimed PBS broadcast, "In Performance at The White House" for President and Mrs. Ronald Reagan. As a member of the Muir Quartet, Mr. Reynolds has performed well over 1,200 concerts throughout North America, Europe and the Far East. He received an honorary doctorate from Rhode Island College in 1995. Mr. Reynolds has appeared in recitals throughout the U.S., and his recording of the complete Bach Suites for Solo Cello has received much critical acclaim. He is the President of EcoClassics, Inc., a nonprofit CD company, and is also Artistic Director of Classics for Kids Foundation, and the Artistic Director of the Muir Quartet Scholarship program in Park City, Utah.



American hornist David Jolley has been acclaimed as one of his generation's most notable soloists. His performances have taken him all over North and South America, Europe, East Asia, and Japan. A chamber artist of unusual sensitivity and range, Mr. Jolley has frequently collaborated with such groups as the Kalichstein-Laredo-Robinson Trio, the Guarneri Quartet, the American String Quartet, the Beaux Arts Trio, Musicians from Marlboro, and the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center. Mr. Jollev is a member of the virtuoso woodwind quintet, Windscape, whose first CD for Arabesque was released in 1999. He is also a member of a newly formed trio with violinist Michael Tree and pianist Leon Fleischer. Mr. Jollev is also a hornist with the Orpheus Chamber Orchestra. Mr. Jolley's keen interest in enlarging the solo horn literature has led to the composition for him of many new works, including Ellen Taaffe Zwilich's Concerto for Horn and String Orchestra, which Mr. Jolley premiered at the Bravo! Colorado Festival, and which was subsequently premiered in New York with the Orpheus Chamber Orchestra at Carnegie Hall. In addition, Jolly and the Orion String Quartet premiered George Perl's Duo for Horn and String Quartet at Alice Tully Hall in New York.

He has performed in many summer music festivals, including the Marlboro Festival, Aspen, Sarasota, Bravo!Colorado, and Music from Angel Fire. Mr. Jolley is on the faculties of the Mannes College of Music, Queens College CUNY, and the North Carolina School for the Arts.




John Marcellus is currently Professor of Trombone at the Eastman School of Music and Chairman of the Woodwind, Brass and Percussion Department. He is also a member of the Eastman Brass, Director of the Eastman Trombone Choir and Music Director of the Brighton Symphony Orchestra since 1980. He has been Principal Trombone of the Chautauqua Symphony Orchestra for the past 24 years.

In demand as a soloist, clinician and conductor, he has performed with the National Symphony Brass Quintet, Washington Theater Chamber Players, and the Contemporary Music Forum. Solo recitals and master classes have been presented in Paris, Cologne, Stuttgart, and Trossingen, Germany; Birmingham, Manchester, and Stockholm, Nörkoping, Sweden; Helsinki, Vaanta, and Lathi, Finland; Copenhagen, and Brisbane, Australia.

As a conductor, he is the founder of the Genesee River Brass Band, the Chautauqua Windjammers and the Catholic University Trombone Choir. As a guest conductor, he has conducted the Chautauqua Symphony, Penfield Symphony Orchestra, and the U.S. Naval Academy Band. Marcellus has premiered over 50 contemporary works for trombone and trombone ensemble and is a clinician for the United Musical Instruments Company, which is now a part of the Conn-Selmer Company. He performs on the 88H Trombone, 36H Alto Trombone and the 2280 King Euphonium.

He is a founding Board member and Past President of the International Trombone Association. In 1999, he was awarded the coveted ITA Award by the International Trombone Association in honor of his contributions to trombone performance, pedagogy and literature.



Naumburg-Award-winning violinist **Andrew Jennings** has achieved international acclaim as both a performer and a teacher. As a soloist and chamber musician he has appeared in virtually every state and province in the US and Canada as well as most of the major cities of Europe. He can be heard on recordings for RCA, Nonesuch, Vox, Turnabout, CRI, Danacord, Crystal and MMO, and these recordings have twice received Grammy recognition. His chamber music career has included a sixteen-year tenure with the acclaimed Concord String Quartet, as well as the Gabrielli Trio and his current membership in the Concord Trio. As a leading exponent of new music, he has given nearly three hundred premiere performances as well as acclaimed surveys of the complete chamber and duo works of Bach, Beethoven, Schubert, Ives, Brahms, Rochberg, Bartok, and others. Mr. Jennings' teaching credentials include longterm appointments as artist-in-residence at Dartmouth College and the University of Akron. He currently holds simultaneous appointments as Professor of violin and chamber music at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor and the Oberlin College Conservatory. He has been a member of the artist faculty of the Tanglewood Music Center for the past fifteen years where he holds the Richard Burgin Master Teacher Chair and also served on the faculty of the Musicorda Festival at Mount Holyoke College, He and his wife, the pianist Gail Jennings, are currently preparing a recording of works by Szymanowski, Sibelius and Schubert.

The Value of Competition

Although I seldom admit this, I really don't like competitions of any kind. I will occasionally watch a televised football, basketball or soccer game until the end approaches. Then, I'm out of the room. I can't stand to see people lose.

That said, my job is to make sure that the Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition takes place each year as seamlessly as possible. Talk about a conflict of interest! After all, what in the world does a refined art form like chamber music have to do with competition? Isn't the performance of a Brahms piano trio or a Shostakovich string quartet beyond comparison or score-keeping? I think so. The reason I have chosen my life course has little to do with beating another team or being better than someone else. It has everything to do with encouraging young people to pursue their passion for chamber music.

It is always reassuring to me to see how healthy the participants' attitudes are toward competing. After all, few will win prizes, only 9 out of 62. That means 85% will not be taking home prize money or medals. For most of them, however, competition is about getting better. It's about the journey. These young people are remarkably resilient and thrive in a competitive format.

Joseph Fischoff, the competition's founder, understood this. He seemed to know from the beginning that young chamber musicians are focused, goal-oriented and eager to test their skills and musical interpretations. He was also concerned that they be treated well and offered exceptional learning opportunities. This is why the competitive rounds are only part of the Fischoff experience. Over the course of the weekend, young musicians receive both written and oral critiques from the panel of jurors. They have the opportunity of participating in master classes and perform in area settings such as homes, schools, businesses and community forums. Just as important, they have the chance to meet other chamber musicians who have worked so very hard to achieve so much. This networking is invaluable to the next generation of our nation's finest young performers.

So, each year 250 students representing more than twenty nationalities from America's finest music schools and conservatories gather to perform, study, be critiqued, network and, oh yes, compete. And they love it! That's because they're all winners in a sense. The Fischoff experience has enriched them and all of us, too.
