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

Cellist Thomas Rosenberg, Artistic Director of the Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition since 1981, is nationally known as a dynamic teacher, chamber music coach, and performer. He is on the faculties of the University of Minnesota as Coordinator of the String Chamber Music Program and at Macalester and Carleton Colleges where he teaches cello. While maintaining a busy private studio of cellists and chamber ensembles, Mr. Rosenberg often performs with the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra, the Minnesota Orchestra, and plays in four different piano trios. He is recipient of the "Master Studio Teacher Award" from ASTA Minnesota, the McKnight Performing Artist Fellowship Award, Arts Educator of the Year from the Michiana Arts and Sciences Council, top chamber music prizes at the Munich (Germany), Portsmouth (England), and Chicago's "Discovery" Competitions and is a three-time Naumburg Award finalist. Previously, he was a founding member of the Chester String Quartet and was on the faculty of Indiana University South Bend from 1980-1998. Tom is a graduate of Oberlin and the Eastman School of Music where he was teaching assistant to both Paul Katz and Laurence Lesser. Other teachers include Richard Kapuscinski, Alan Harris, Alta Mayer and for chamber music, members of the Budapest, Juilliard, Tokyo, Guarneri, and Cleveland Quartets.







Fiscal Year 2006 (July 06-June 07)





Introduced in 1995, the Fischoff Residency Program is dedicated to providing interactive music and literacy programs for underserved children and at-risk youth, and early arts intervention for children ages four through nine. Residency programs take on many forms including S.A.M. I Am (Stories & Music) and Peanut Butter & Jelly Jam family workshops. In 2007-08, CINCO Brass Quintet from Chicago, and the Fry Street Quartet, faculty-in-residence at Utah State University presented eighteen programs for more than 4,000 children during two weeks of outreach performances. The Fischoff is so pleased to bring back these talented chamber ensembles as seasoned educators dedicated to mentoring children and sharing their deep passion for chamber music.

LOOKING AHEAD: The 2008-09 Fischoff Residency will forge a new collaboration with the Euclid Quartet, now in residency at Indiana University South Bend. Together, Fischoff and the Euclid Quartet will present a comprehensive residency for all of the public schools of Mishawaka, Indiana.



How the Jury Selects the Winner

How does a juror make his or her selection of the "best" ensemble from all the competitors? It can be a Herculean task. The distinguished jurors of the 2008 Competition do have some formulas on which they can rely. However, their decisions are guided primarily by their own musical integrity and experience as performers and instructors. They listen for interpretation—tempi and dynamics; ensemble performance—balance within the ensemble, blend, and unity of the members; technical accuracy—rhythm and intonation; and overall performance—poise, artistic impression, and expression.

Jurors individually rank the ensembles in each division. These rankings are combined, then averaged for each ensemble to arrive at a group's composite ranking. Rankings are a good method for determining the prize winners, but the real value for these young musicians comes from the written comments of the jurors. The juror evaluations are distributed to all performing ensembles at the completion of the Competition. From these written comments, the musicians gain valuable and constructive feedback, which is intended to stimulate their growth as artists and ensembles.

Identifying conflict of interest issues is very important to the integrity of the competition. Conflicts of interest between jurors and ensembles or any individuals within an ensemble are carefully identified and handled appropriately.

HISTORY OF THE COMPETITION

South Bend is proud to be the home of one of the nation's premier musical events, the renowned Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition. Founded in 1973 by Joseph E. Fischoff and members of the South Bend Chamber Music Society, this prestigious event was originally intended to encourage emerging instrumental chamber musicians and provide a national forum for their talents. In that first year, six ensembles participated.

Today, the original mission remains constant and has broadened to include Senior String and Wind Divisions as well as a Junior Division for musicians age 18 and under. The scope of Fischoff has also grown by utilizing the talents of these amazing young musicians through community outreach programs and by designing Arts-in-Education Residencies that bring Fischoff alumni as well as other chamber music ensembles back to the community for outreach programs.



JOSEPH E. FISCHOFF 1907-1992

Joe Fischoff loved music, especially chamber music. Born in Hungary in 1907, his family settled in South Bend where he graduated from South Bend High School in 1925. As a young man, he simultaneously attended Philadelphia's Wharton School of Business and the Curtis Institute of Music. In 1929, he

graduated from Wharton with a degree in Economics while studying viola with Louis Bailley and chamber music at Curtis. When the first orchestra was started at Curtis, conductor Leopold Stokowski invited Joe to audition, and he played in the viola section.

While he did not professionally pursue music, he played chamber music in his home every week for as long as he could continue to play. In the furniture business by trade, Joe was a musician at heart and loved to encourage young people to continue the art of chamber music through the Fischoff Competition.

As the competition grew, so did the temptation to become like all other competitions. He quietly insisted that this competition be different. It was to be founded in education and mentoring. His goal became ours—to provide a positive and constructive experience for all musicians. Because of him, Fischoff not only seeks out excellence, but also seeks the education of as many people as possible to be chamber musicians, to listen to chamber music, and most of all, to love chamber music.

Junior Quarterfinal Jurors

The Quarterfinal Round was introduced in 1996 to allow for increased applications to the Junior Division of the Fischoff Competition. This Round provides an additional day of competition and master classes. The Quarterfinal Round offers a valuable educational component for our youngest participants. From this group, twelve ensembles will be selected to compete in the Junior Semifinal on Saturday. Master classes, conducted by the panel of Quarterfinal jurors, will be offered Saturday morning.

Fischoff is honored and pleased to welcome the following 2008 Quarterfinal jurors.



Fritz Gearhart is currently Professor of Violin and Chamber Music at the University of Oregon School of Music where he also performs as a member of the Oregon String Quartet. He holds master's and bachelor's degrees from the Eastman School of Music where he studied with Donald Weilerstein. Earlier studies at the Hartt School included work with Charles Treger and members of the Emerson Quartet. He is an active solo and chamber performer, and was a former member of the Chester String Quartet and the New York Chamber Ensemble. Mr. Gearhart has performed in major halls around the country, including Alice Tully Hall, Carnegie Recital Hall, the 92nd Street Y, as well as the Terrace Theater at the Kennedy Center. Most recently, Mr. Gearhart worked with the Oregon String Quartet to complete their newest recording: The Oregon String Quartet and All That Jazz, Jazz Influences in the Contemporary American String Quartet, now available on the Koch Entertainment label. A dedicated music educator, Gearhart has taught at the university level since 1989, with previous appointments at East Carolina University and Indiana University at South Bend. He has presented master classes at many music schools including Texas Christian University, Boise State University, Ithaca College, Eastman School of Music, and the Hartt School, among others. At the 2007 National ASTA conference in Detroit, he was the presenter at several sessions including the ASTA Chamber Music Master Class, and three NSOA Violin Master Classes. In addition to his many performing and teaching activities, Mr. Gearhart has appeared as a guest

conductor at several string festivals around the country.



Jeanne Kierman Fischer, pianist, is a graduate of the Oberlin Conservatory of Music, the Dalcroze School, and the New England Conservatory of Music. Ms. Kierman studied with William Masselos, Miles Mauney, Victor Rosenbaum, and Menachem Pressler. Formerly on the faculties of the Oberlin Conservatory and Dartmouth College, Ms. Kierman currently serves as Artist Teacher of Piano at Rice University, Shepherd School of Music. She has made a professional specialty as a contemporary music performer and player/teacher of ensemble repertoire. For ten years she toured extensively under the sponsorship of the New England Foundation and the Vermont Arts Council as a member of the Alcott Piano Quartet. She has performed for Da Camera of Houston, Mohawk Trail Concerts, Chamber Music Ann Arbor, Skaneateles and the Marrowstone Festival among others. As pianist of the Fischer Duo for the last thirty-five years, she and cellist Norman Fischer have toured all over the United States and as Artistic Ambassadors for the United States Information Agency in South America and South Africa. In the summer months, Ms. Kierman works with high school students in piano chamber music at the Greenwood Music Camp in Massachusetts and performs with the Concord Trio. Ms. Kierman has written about her experiences as a Collaborative Pianist as featured in Piano and Keyboard Magazine and has recorded for Northeastern, Gasparo, Bridge and Naxos Records.

The Fischoff Competition welcomes **Larry Livingston**, noted conductor, educator and consultant. Mr. Livingston will be offering his expert oversight through observing and evaluating all aspects of the competition. This invaluable feedback will serve to inform our team as to how we can work to better refine, stabilize and increase national awareness of the Fischoff Competition.

Deborah Chodacki, Associate Professor of Clarinet, joined the faculty of the University of Michigan School of Music, Theater & Dance in 1993. Ms. Chodacki has performed and taught on four continents, including residencies in China, South Korea, South America, Europe, Puerto Rico, Canada and the United States. Ms. Chodacki has appeared as soloist, in recital, and as an orchestral performer at the Skaneateles Festival in the Finger Lakes of NY, the Spoleto Festival Dei Due Mondi in Italy, North Carolina Symphony, Alabama Symphony, Charleston, SC Symphony, Grand Rapids, MI, and Toledo, OH, Colorado Philharmonic, Illinois Philharmonic, and the American Chamber Symphony. Her solo and recital performances have been chosen for broadcast on NPR's "Performance Today." Her students have earned concerto appearances with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, the Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra, Grand Rapids Symphony, Columbus, OH Symphony Orchestra, and the Interlochen Center for the Arts orchestras, summer and winter programs. Deborah Chodacki earned her performance degrees from the Eastman School of Music, with Distinction, and from Northwestern University's School of Music. Her clarinet studies were with Stanley Hasty and Robert Marcellus. Prior to her appointment at Michigan, she was a member of the faculties of the Interlochen Arts Academy and East Carolina University's School of Music.

George Taylor is currently Associate Professor of Viola at the Eastman School of Music. Before joining the Eastman faculty, he was a member of the Ciompi Quartet of Duke University, a position he held from 1979 through 1986. Mr. Taylor has served on the artist faculties of the Green Mountain Music Festival. Encore School for Strings, Muscoda, the Meadowmount School, the Manchester Music Festival, and the Elan International Music Festival among others. He has also served as a juror for international competitions in Europe and the United States. Mr. Taylor has given numerous solo recitals and appeared as a chamber musician in concerts throughout the United States and at the Tainan Cultural Center in Taiwan. He was also cofounder and conductor of the St. Stephens Chamber Orchestra (now known as the Orchestra of the Triangle, Durham, NC), an ensemble that is still active in performance and recordings to date. Mr. Taylor has performed and premiered works written for him by many composers, including Ron Carter, Noel DaCosta, George Walker, David Liptak and Carmen Moore. A native of New York City, Mr. Taylor attended the Manhattan School of Music where his teachers included Jaime Laredo, Raphael Bronstein and Burton Kaplan. Further studies on viola were with Michael Tree and Abraham Skernick. Chamber music studies include such notables as Arthur Balsam, Joseph Seiger, Lillian Fuchs, Joseph Gingold, Mischa Schneider, and members of the Guarnari Quartet. He made his recital debut at Carnegie Recital Hall in 1979.



Trumpeter, Kevin Cobb received a Bachelor of Music degree from the Curtis Institute of Music where he studied with Frank Kaderabek, and a Master of Music degree from The Juilliard School as a student of Mark Gould. Mr. Cobb joined the American Brass Quintet in the fall of 1998 and with that appointment also became a faculty member of The Juilliard School and the Aspen Music Festival and School. He also currently serves on the faculty of the Mason Gross School of the Arts at Rutgers University as well as SUNY Stony Brook. When not touring with ABQ, Mr. Cobb enjoys an active teaching and performance career in New York City. As part of a widely diverse freelance life, he often plays with new music groups such as Speculum Musicae, and the New York New Music Ensemble, as well as with the Metropolitan Opera, the Orchestra of St. Luke's, the New York City Ballet, and the New York Philharmonic. From 1995-98, he spent his summers as principal trumpet for the Utah Festival Opera Company. He is also a member of the New York Big Brass, plays in Broadway shows, tours with the Paragon Ragtime Orchestra, and can frequently be heard in radio and television commercials. He has even played with the Orchestra of St. Luke's as they accompanied Metallica at Madison Square Garden for a sold out audience. Mr. Cobb has participated in chamber music at every stage of his development and is a former member of the Manhattan Brass Ouintet and the Meridian Arts Ensemble. As a soloist, he toured the United States with the Israel Camarata of Jerusalem playing the Shostakovich Concerto for Piano, Trumpet and Strings. In 2003, he was a featured soloist with the Daejeon Philharmonic in South Korea playing the Haydn Concerto on national television. Since 1998, he has completed eight recordings with the American Brass Quintet. His first solo CD entitled, "One" released by Summit Records, features an all American program of unaccompanied trumpet solos.

Laurie Smukler is Professor of Violin and the head of the string area in the Conservatory of Music at SUNY, Purchase College, where she is also artistic director of the "Faculty and Friends" concert series. In addition to teaching violin and chamber music, she is an active performer as soloist and recitalist, and has established a reputation as one of the finest chamber musicians in the country. Last season she performed the complete Brahms Sonatas in numerous recitals, with both Jon Klibonoff and Jeremy Denk as pianists. Ms. Smukler performs regularly with the Festival Chamber Music Society at Merkin Hall in New York City, with DaCamera of Houston in Texas, with the Bard Festival String Quartet, Bard College, and at numerous venues on the east coast, including the Pierpont Morgan Library. She is active as co-artistic director and performer for the "Collection in Concert" series, which presents mixed programs of works based on the Pierpont Morgan Library's astounding collection of music manuscripts. Ms. Smukler also teaches and performs at the prestigious Kneisel Hall Chamber Music Festival. She has been an invited guest at many summer festivals across the country, including the Santa Fe Chamber Music Festival, the Marlboro Festival, Chamber music Northwest, the Bard Festival, the Mostly Mozart Festival, the Skaneateles Festival, and the Mount Desert Island Festival. As a chamber musician, Ms. Smukler was the founding first violinist of the Mendelssohn String Quartet. She has collaborated with many of the great artists of our time, including Rudolf Serkin, Menahem Pressler, Richard Goode, Leon Fleischer, Rudolf Firkusny, Dawn Upshaw, Benita Valente, Evelyn Lear, Oscar Shumsky, Robert Mann, Michael Tree, and the Vermeer and Emerson String Quartets. Ms. Smukler plays a Petrus Guarnerius violin made in Venice in 1738

Massimo Mercelli, internationally acclaimed concert flautist, is sponsored by the Nanovic Institute for European Studies, University of Notre Dame. He studied with André Jaunet and Maxence Larrieu, and at just nineteen years of age, he became the first flute at Teatro La Fenice in Venice. He has performed as a soloist in some of the world's most prestigious concert halls, like Carnegie Hall of New York, Moscow Conservatory, Oslo's Conserthuset, Monaco's Herkulessaal and Gasteig, Colon Theatre of Buenos Aires, RAI Auditoriums at Turin and Naples, Concertgebouw of Amsterdam, St-Martin-in-the-Fields of London, Mozarteum of Salzburg, Victoria Hall of Geneva, Parco della Musica of Rome and Saint Petersburg Philharmonic. Mr. Marcelli has worked with artists such as Yuri Bashmet, Jean-Pierre Rampal, Krzysztof Penderecki, Peter-Luckas Graf, Maxence Larrieu, Federico Mondelci, Anna Caterina Antonacci, Susanna Mildonian, Patrizia Tassini, and Cecelia Gasdia, and with orchestras such as the Moscow Soloists, the Lithuanian National Symphony Orchestra, the Roma Opera House Orchestra, the Salzburg Soloists, the Moscow Chamber Orchestra, the Wiener Symphoniker, the European Chamber Orchestra, the Soloists of Teatro alla Scala, the Slovenian Radio and Television Orchestra and the Riga Philharmonic Orchestra. More recently he performed at London's Wigmore Hall and Salzburg's Mozarteum, held a Master Class at the Rostropovich Foundation and played a first performance of Philip Glass's composition "Facades" for flute and piano, with the composer at the piano. Massimo Mercelli is the artistic director and founder of Emilia Romagna Festival. In addition to his work with the Fischoff, Mr. Mercelli has served as a juror for prestigious international competitions such as Jean-Pierre Rampal of Paris, the Geneva Competition, and the Concert Artist Guild of New York.







Internationally acclaimed Canadian hornist Jeff Nelsen's eclectic career comprises a true cross-section of the music industry. He is equally successful in both classical and contemporary genres and in the roles of both musician and mentor. As a performer, leff is best known as the hornist of the world famous Canadian Brass, with whom he continues to perform concerts all over the world. As a pedagogue, Jeff teaches horn, chamber music, and trains students in what he calls "Fearlessness" at the prestigious Indiana University Jacobs School of Music. Jeff has held positions in the Montreal, Vancouver, and Winnipeg symphony orchestras. As a member of Canadian Brass, in addition to the hundreds of quintet recitals performed all over the world, Jeff has been featured with countless symphony orchestras including Atlanta, Baltimore, Detroit, Houston, Minnesota, Philadelphia, Seattle, and St. Louis. Jeff continues to attract rave reviews as a featured soloist on the Canadian Brass release "Magic Horn." This CD was nominated for the 2006 Juno Award (Canadian equivalent to the Grammy Award) for "Best Classical Album of the Year: Solo or Chamber Ensemble." Intensely active as a soloist, chamber musician, and clinician, Mr. Nelsen has appeared at numerous international music festivals including Ravinia, Tanglewood, Blossom, Music Academy of the West, Banff, Las Vegas, and St. Barthlélemy. Prior to joining the faculty at Indiana University, Jeff had been on faculty at the Universities of Toronto. British Columbia, Victoria, and McGill University in Montreal. He has recurring articles focusing on "Fearlessness" in the magazines for the International Horn Society and the British Horn Society. His debut publication, "Fearless Auditioning Simple Easier" is due for release in 2008.

Pianist Anne Epperson enjoys a distinguished career as a performer, recording artist, teacher and clinician. She made her debut at age twelve with the New Orleans Philharmonic under Alexander Hilsberg. After studies at Louisiana State University and the Juilliard School, she entered graduate school at the University of Southern California and was appointed staff pianist for the master classes of Jascha Heifetz. This auspicious beginning led to a successful career as a collaborative partner. Ms Epperson has appeared in concert with distinguished artists throughout the United States, Canada, South America, Mexico, Europe, Israel and Scandinavia. From 1980-89 she toured the U.S. as pianist with the Canterbury Trio, under the auspices of Columbia Artists Management, Inc. Her career as an educator is equally impressive. Newly appointed as Professor of Collaborative Piano at the University of Colorado at Boulder's School of Music, she has been Professor of Music and Director of Collaborative Arts at the University of California - Santa Barbara since 2001. From 1985-2001 she was head of the Collaborative Piano Department at the Cleveland Institute of Music. She has been juror for many prestigious competitions, including the Walter W. Naumburg Foundation competitions, the Fischoff Chamber Music competitions, the New Orleans International Piano Competition, the Corpus Christi International Young Artists Competition and the Los Angeles Music Center Spotlight Awards. Ms. Epperson has been a panelist, lecturer and master class presenter for the Music Teachers National Association, National Conference on Piano Pedagogy, the Indiana Music Teachers Association. the South Carolina Music Teachers Association and the Vocal Arts Resource Network in Ohio. She is active as a consultant and advisor in the development of collaborative piano programs nationwide. Anne Epperson is currently on the artist faculty of the Music Academy of the West in Santa Barbara and the International Festival Institute at Round Top, Texas.

Cellist, Marc Johnson, was born to a musical family in Lincoln, Nebraska. Under the tutelage of his first teacher Carol Work, he won several national competitions and was accepted as a scholarship student at the Eastman School of Music. While there, he studied with Ronald Leonard and John Celentano. He continued his studies at Indiana University where he was a student of Janos Starker and Josef Gingold. For thirtyfive years, Mr. Johnson performed as the cellist for the renowned Vermeer Quartet. The Vermeer Quartet received three Grammy nominations; one for Haydn's Seven Last Words of Christ, another for their recording of the Shostakovich and Schnittke Piano Quintets, and a third for the complete quartets of Bela Bartok. The Quartet appeared regularly at the world's great music festivals, and held residency positions with Northern Illinois University, Bay Chamber Concerts in Rockport, Maine, and The Royal Northern College of Music in Manchester, England. Mr. Johnson continues to pursue an active career since the quartet's retirement in 2007, appearing in recital, and as soloist with orchestras in North America and Europe. and is a frequent presenter of master classes here and abroad. He and his wife, the pianist Katherine Johnson, are co-directors of Bay Chamber Concerts, the Next Generation, a series of free chamber music seminars for students from the state of Maine. He has been active in the commissioning of new works for both cello and string quartet, and has recorded for CRI Records. He joined the faculty of Boston University in September, 2007. His cello is a fine, old Italian instrument made c. 1730 by Francesco Stradivarius.





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
FISCHOFF NATIONAL ADVISORY COUNCIL

The Fischoff National Advisory Council advises the Fischoff Board of Directors on matters of a national scope. Each member brings a unique perspective on the nature of the arts in America.



Pianist **Wu Han** ranks among the most esteemed and influential classical musicians in the world today. She appears regularly in many prestigious venues across the United States, Europe and the Far East as both soloist and chamber musician, and has toured extensively as duo pianist with cellist David Finckel. Wu Han's wide-ranging

musical activities include the founding of ArtistLed, classical music's first musician-directed and Internet-based recording company. The *Denver Post* described ArtistLed as "a classical music breakthrough." Wu Han and David Finckel serve as Artistic Directors of The Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center. They are also Artistic Directors of Music@Menlo, a chamber music festival in Silicon Valley that has garnered international acclaim since its inception in 2003. Prior to launching Music@Menlo, Wu Han and David Finckel served for three seasons as Artistic Directors of SummerFest La Jolla.



Massimo Mercelli is an internationally acclaimed concert flautist. He studied with Andrè Jaunet and Maxence Larrieu, and at just nineteen years of age, he became the first flute at *Teatro La Fenice* in Venice. Mr. Mercelli subsequently won the *Premio Francesco Cilea*, the Concorso Internazionale Giornate Musicali and the *Concorso Internazionale di*

Stresa. He has performed as a soloist in some of the world's most prestigious concert halls and important festivals. In 2006 he played the first performance of "Façades" by Philip Glass with the composer at the piano, and performed at the Wigmore Hall of London and Mozarteum of Salzburg. Mr. Mercelli is also the founder and artistic director of the Emilia Romagna Festival. He has been a member of the directive committee of the European Festival Association since 2001. In addition to his work with the Fischoff, Mr. Mercelli has served as a juror for prestigious international competitions such as Jean-Pierre Rampal of Paris, the Geneva Competition, and the Concert Artist Guild of New York. On May 14, he will perform in the Berliner Philarmonie as part of the official series.





Heidi Castleman is Professor of Viola at the Juilliard School of Music, where she teaches at both pre-college and graduate levels. She has taught at the Cleveland Institute of Music, the Eastman School of Music, New England Conservatory, SUNY Purchase, Rice University and Philadelphia Musical Academy. Ms. Castleman was also co-founder and viola faculty of the Quartet Program (1970 to 1990). Since 2001, she has worked with students, ages 12 to 18, at the Perlman Music Program. A founding trustee of

Chamber Music America, Ms. Castleman served as President from 1983 to 1987. She also served on the board of the American String Teachers Association (ASTA) and currently is on the board of the Perlman Music Program. As a panelist and committee member, Ms. Castleman has served the National Endowment for the Arts, the New York State Council of the Arts, the Music Educators National Conference (MENC), American String Teachers Association (ASTA), the National Association of Schools of Music, the Lila Wallace Readers Digest Fund and the Andrew Mellon Foundation. She is the recipient of both the Richard J. Bogomolny National Service Award from Chamber Music America and the Artist-Teacher of the Year Award by ASTA with NSOA. In 2004, Ms. Castleman received the Maurice W. Riley Viola Award at the American Viola Society Congress for Distinguished Contributions to the Viola, and in 2006, was awarded an Honorary Doctorate degree from the University of Montreal.



As cellist for 26 years of the Cleveland Quartet, **Paul Katz** appeared in more than 2,500 concerts on four continents and made 70 recordings, which earned 11 GRAMMY nominations and two GRAMMY Awards. The members of the CQ were the first classical artists ever to appear on the GRAMMY Awards telecast. He was a student of Bernard Greenhouse, Gregor Piatigorsky, Janos Starker and Leonard Rose. In September 2001, he joined the faculty of the New England Conservatory of Music where he teaches

cello and mentors a training program for young professional string quartets. In 2001, he was awarded Chamber Music America's highest honor, the National Service Award, given for a lifetime of distinguished service to the field of chamber music. The American String Teachers Association named Paul Katz their "Artist-Teacher 2003," and Indiana University awarded him its coveted Chevalier du Violoncelle for distinguished achievements and contributions to the world of cell playing and teaching. He is currently filming "Cello Bello – The Making of an Artist," a DVD/web film providing inspiration and technical advice on mastering the instrument, and a look into the world of the aspiring young artist.

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John A. Haynes is Executive Director and CEO of PACE, a new \$160 million performing arts center under development in Bellevue, Washington. Mr. Haynes was formerly the Judd and Mary Lou Leighton Director for the Performing Arts at the University of Notre Dame and the founding Executive Director of the Marie P. DeBartolo Center for the Performing Arts. He previously served as the chief executive of large cultural institutions in Minneapolis and San Diego and continues to consult with clients nationally and internationally on program planning, board development and theatre design. Mr Haynes began his career as a program executive at the CBS Television Network in New York and Viacom in Hollywood.



Dennis Bumber started his small company, The Woodwind & Brasswind, in 1978 in South Bend, Indiana. Since then, it has grown into one of the largest sellers of musical instruments in the world with an international reputation. He holds Bachelor and Master of Music degrees in performance from Indiana University, Bloomington. He recently sold The Woodwind & Brasswind to The Guitar Center Corporation, the largest music retailer in the world and is acting as a consultant for them. In addition, he is the majority shareholder in the French retail and internet music company, WoodBrass.Com.
