



Welcome to the University of Notre Dame and to the 46th Annual Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition. We are delighted to host this wonderful event each year.





Inspiring lives through breathtaking performances



HISTORY OF THE FISCHOFF

In 1973, Joseph E. Fischoff and fellow members of the South Bend Chamber Music Society sought an innovative way of encouraging young people to pursue chamber music study and performance. The idea of a competition arose, and that first year, six ensembles participated.

Little did the society members know how their idea would grow. Today, still at home in South Bend, Indiana, The Fischoff Competition is the largest chamber music competition in the world. Each year, an average of 135 ensembles, representing 28 nationalities, enter in either the strings/piano or winds/brass categories of three to six performers. Since its founding, more than 6,800 musicians have participated, many of whom have gone on to distinguished careers in music performance and education.

Committed to music education, The Fischoff uniquely partners with competition alumni to bring free, innovative music programs directly to children in their own schools and community centers. Known as The Fischoff Arts-in-Education Residency, these programs have served more than 70,000 community children since 1995 and reach more than 4,000 underserved and at-risk young people every year. Additionally, The Fischoff offers several programs to support and encourage area high school-aged musicians.



JOSEPH E. FISCHOFF 1907-1992

Joe Fischoff loved music, especially chamber music. Born in Hungary in 1907, his family settled in South Bend where he graduated from South Bend High School in 1925. As a young man, he simultaneously attended Philadelphia's Wharton School of Business and the Curtis Institute of Music. In 1929, he graduated from Wharton with a degree in Economics while studying viola with Louis Bailly and chamber music at Curtis. When the first orchestra was started at Curtis, conductor Leopold Stokowski invited Joe to audition, and he played in the viola section.

While he did not professionally pursue music, he played chamber music in his home every week for as long as he could continue to play. In the furniture business by trade, Joe was a musician at heart and loved to encourage young people to continue the art of chamber music through The Fischoff Competition.

As the competition grew, so did the temptation to become like all other competitions. He quietly insisted that this competition be different. It was to be founded in education and mentoring. His goal became ours — to provide a positive and constructive experience for all musicians. Because of him, The Fischoff not only seeks out excellence, but also seeks the education of as many people as possible to be chamber musicians, to listen to chamber music, and most of all, to love chamber music.

The Fischoff National Advisory Council

The Fischoff National Advisory Council advises The Fischoff Board of Directors on matters of a national scope. Each member brings a unique perspective on the joys and complexities of a career in the performing arts.



Dennis Bamber received his bachelor's and master's degrees in music from Indiana University. Following a career as both teacher and performer, Mr. Bamber founded the Woodwind & Brasswind. Over the course of his 25+ years of leadership, the company became one of

the most successful retailers of instruments in the world. He served as president of the Barrington Music Group, an import musical instrument company, and Is now a member of the Chairman's Club with Cressy & Everett Real Estate.



Heidi Castleman teaches viola at The Juilliard School, Aspen Music Festival, and the Heifetz Institute. Formerly faculty: Cleveland Institute of Music, Eastman School of Music, New England Conservatory. Ms. Castleman is a member of New York String Sextet. Honors/

Awards: 2001 Chamber Music America Richard J. Bogomolny National Service Award; 2002 ASTA with N.S.O.A. National Artist-Teacher of the Year, 2004 AVS Maurice W. Riley Viola Award for Distinguished Contributions to the Viola; and a 2006 honorary doctorate from University of Montreal.



Named Musical America's Musician of the Year in 2012, pianist **Wu Han** ranks among the most influential classical musicians in the world. She maintains international prominence as a concert performer, recording artist, educator, arts administrator, and cultural entrepreneur.

Together with David Finckel, she serves as Artistic Codirector of The Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center, Founding Artistic Codirector of Music@Menlo (Silicon Valley), as well as Artistic Codirector of Chamber Music Today (Seoul, South Korea). In 2013, she established the Finckel-Wu Han Chamber Music Studio at the Aspen Music Festival and School.



John Haynes is President of Bard Arts Consulting, a firm specializing in the development of new cultural facilities and executive search for senior-level performing arts leaders. Mr. Haynes was the founding executive director of the DeBartolo Center and the inaugural Judd

and Mary Lou Leighton Director for the Performing Arts at the University of Notre Dame. A past president of the Western Arts Alliance, he has been active as a national advocate for public arts funding, an NEA panelist, and a cultural consultant to a variety of private and public entities.



Paul Katz was cellist of the internationally-acclaimed Cleveland Quartet from 1969–1995. The Cleveland Quartet produced 70 recordings, earned "Best of the Year" awards from Time Magazine and Stereo Review, 11 Grammy nominations, and 2 Grammy Awards.

Mr. Katz teaches at the New England Conservatory. In 2010, he created CelloBello.com, an online resource center for cellists worldwide featuring Katz's video lessons in seven languages, interviews, blogs, live cello chats, streamed concerts and masterclasses by many of the world's greatest artist/teachers.



Massimo Mercelli is artistic director and founder of Italy's Emilia Romagna Festival. Since 2001 he has been a member of the advisory board of the European Festivals Association (EFA). Mr. Mercelli has been an adjudicator at the International Competition of Geneva,

Jean-Pierre Rampal International Flute Competition – Concours internationaux de la Ville de Paris, Concert Artist Guild of New York, The Fischoff Competition, and the Beijing Flute Competition. Mr. Mercelli has been recognized by the European Commissioner for Culture and by the French Deputy Minister for Culture for his work as a promoter of music.



Vincent D. Rougeau became Dean of Boston College Law School on July 1, 2011. He previously served as a professor of law at the University of Notre Dame, and as a member of The Fischoff Board of Directors. Dean Rougeau is a leading voice for reform

in legal education in the US and abroad and an expert in Catholic social thought. He and his wife, Dr. Robin Kornegay-Rougeau, have been active supporters of the arts in South Bend and in greater Boston for many years.



Anna M. Thompson most recently served as the Associate Vice President for UABs Alys Stephens Center. Previously, she served as the executive director of the DeBartolo Performing Arts Center and the endowed Judd & Mary Lou Leighton Director of the Performing Arts at the

University of Notre Dame from 2007–2015, as the executive director for fine arts programming at the College of Saint Benedict and Saint John's University (MN).

Carmen Creel joined The Fischoff in July 2018 and is accomplished in a wide variety of musical arenas. As an artistic administrator, she worked with Michael Tilson Thomas (MTT) during his first 10 years as Music Director of the San Francisco Symphony, and

later as Associate Artistic Administrator at the New World Symphony. As a classically trained clarinetist, she served as 2nd clarinetist with the Sun Valley Music Festival from 1993–2005, and has performed with the San Francisco Symphony, the California Symphony, and the Monterrey Symphony Orchestra. In fundraising and donor engagement, she served as the Director of Principal Gift Engagement at the University of Chicago during the close of their \$2B capital campaign. Ms. Creel taught private clarinet, woodwind chamber music, and coached marching band at Union HS in Tulsa, Oklahoma from 2016-2018. Her students consistently place in top all-state ensembles in Oklahoma and Indiana. She received a BM in Clarinet Performance from the Eastman School of Music and a MM in Clarinet Performance from the San Francisco Conservatory of Music.



HISTORY OF THE COMPETITION

South Bend is proud to be the home of one of the nation's premier musical events, the Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition. Founded in 1973 by Joseph E. Fischoff and members of the South Bend Chamber Music Society, this prestigious event was originally intended to encourage emerging instrumental chamber musicians and provide a national forum for their talents. In that first year, six ensembles participated.

Today, the original mission remains constant and has broadened to include Senior String and Wind Divisions as well as a Junior Division for musicians age 18 and under. It is the largest chamber music competition in the world.

ALUMNI

Thousands of outstanding musicians claim The Fischoff as a defining musical experience in their lives. To these alumni, we offer the opportunity to stay connected with The Fischoff, and to benefit from ongoing relationships with lifetime friends and chamber musicians, venue hosts, presenters, and educators. If you are a past participant in The Fischoff Competition, we invite you to stay connected with us on social media.

HOW THE JURY SELECTS THE WINNER

How does a juror make his or her selection of the "best" ensemble from all the competitors? It can be a Herculean task. The distinguished jurors of the 2019 Competition do have some formulas on which they can rely; however, their decisions are guided primarily by their own musical integrity and experience as performers and instructors. They listen for interpretation — tempo and dynamics; ensemble performance — balance within the ensemble, blend, and unity of the members; technical accuracy — rhythm and intonation; and overall performance — poise and artistic expression.

Jurors individually rank the ensembles in each division. These rankings are combined, then averaged for each ensemble to arrive at a group's composite ranking. Rankings are a good method for determining the prize winners, but the real value for these young musicians comes from the jurors' comments, shared in-person on Saturday evening, and in writing once the Competition concludes. The juror evaluations are distributed to all performing ensembles at the completion of the Competition. From these written comments, the musicians gain valuable and constructive feedback, which is intended to stimulate their growth as artists and ensembles.

Identifying conflict of interest issues is very important to the integrity of the competition. Conflicts of interest between jurors and ensembles, or any individuals within an ensemble, are carefully identified and handled appropriately by the Artistic Director.

Hopefully you will be one of the prize-winning ensembles. But, there is so much you can do to learn and improve while you are here. Do so by enjoying your opportunity to perform, getting both written and verbal feedback from the jurors, listening to other ensembles in both the Junior and Senior Divisions to gain perspective on your own playing, and by getting to know other musicians who are here. Perhaps in the future you will be playing with someone you first met here. Ultimately, you may or may not agree with the difficult decisions the jury must make. Remember that even in your own ensembles, you undoubtedly do not always agree with your colleagues. Playing your best is the only thing you can control. Enjoying yourself and staying focused on the music is the best way to achieve that. Best of luck to all of you.

To our audience and supporters: I give my thanks for your engaged involvement and a plea for your continued

support to the wonderful people and organizations that help fund The Fischoff, and especially to the amazing people on the Fischoff Board and staff.

39 years ago, shortly after starting a residency here with the Chester String Quartet, I was asked to become the Artistic Advisor to a small committee of volunteers. Spearheaded by Joe Fischoff, this group ran a little and relatively unknown competition. The Fischoff has grown into an arts organization of both regional, national, and growing international importance and is a key player in the explosion of chamber music in pre-college, college, and professional levels. Cellist Thomas Rosenberg, Artistic Director of the Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition since 1981, is nationally known as a dynamic teacher, chamber music coach, and performer. A resident of Saint Paul, MN, he is on the faculties of Macalester and Carleton Colleges, maintains an award-winning private studio of pre-college cellists and chamber ensembles, and is Director of the Saint Paul Conservatory's Chamber Music Academy and summer Chamber Music Institute. He is a member of The Isles Ensemble, has performed as an extra musician in the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra and Minnesota Orchestra, and blogs for and has been a live internet chat host on the Cellobello website. He is a three-time Naumburg Award finalist, recipient of top chamber music prizes at the Munich (Germany), Portsmouth (England), and Chicago's "Discovery" Competitions, the "Master Studio Teacher Award" from ASTA Minnesota, the McKnight Performing Artist Fellowship Award, Arts Educator of the Year from the Michiana Arts and Sciences Council, and the 2007 Indiana Governor's Arts Award (along with the Fischoff organization as a whole). Previously, he was a founding member of the highly acclaimed Chester String Quartet, with whom he toured internationally for twenty years, made numerous recordings, and was on the faculty of Indiana University South Bend from 1980–1998. He has performed and taught at many summer festivals including Aspen and Tanglewood, and served as Associate Director and taught at "The Quartet Program." Mr. Rosenberg is a graduate of Oberlin and the Eastman School of Music, where he was teaching assistant to both Paul Katz and Laurence Lesser. Other teachers include Richard Kapuscinski, Alan Harris, Alta Mayer, and for chamber music-members of the Budapest, Juilliard, Tokyo, Guarneri, and Cleveland Quartets.

These ensembles appear in area classrooms to present informal performance-workshops for second to fourth graders. The performance level of The Fischoff Junior ensembles creates an excitement that is a powerful mentoring tool in persuading young children to consider joining their own school or community band and orchestra programs.



With the quartet she held residencies at Harvard University and the Metropolitan Museum of Art, performed worldwide, and recorded the complete string quartets of Brahms and Bartók and a Grammy-nominated album of Jefferson Friedman's Quartets. One half of the multidisciplinary duo The Afield (voice, violin, video and other media), Ms. Fischer has premiered works for solo violin and singing violinist by Lisa Bielawa, Nico Muhly, Paola Prestini, Augusta Read Thomas, Byron Au Yong and others. A graduate of Columbia University (B.A.) and The Juilliard School (M.M., A.D.), Ms. Fischer is a devoted violin teacher, chamber music coach and arts advocate, and currently teaches violin and chamber music at the Mannes School of Music. Liza Stepanova has performed as a soloist with the Southwest-German Philharmonic and in chamber music at the Berlin Museum of Musical Instruments and Belgrade's Kolarac Hall, and in the U.S., she was a top prizewinner at the Liszt-Garrison, Juilliard Concerto,

Steinway, and Ettlingen competitions.

As a member of the Lysander Piano Trio (2010 Fischoff Senior Division Strings/Piano Bronze Medalist), she won the 2012 Concert Artists Guild Competition and received the Grand Prize at the 2011 Coleman Competition. Stepanova has performed as a soloist and chamber musician at the international festivals of Castleton, La Jolla, Music@Menlo, Mostly Mozart, Copenhagen, and Davos, Switzerland.

Ms. Stepanova studied art song collaboration with Wolfram Rieger in Berlin and was invited by the late Dietrich Fischer-Dieskau to perform in his master classes. She was a faculty member of SongFest at The Colburn School (Los Angeles) and served as its Associate Artistic Director/Piano Program Director for two years.

Stepanova received her DMA from The Juilliard School with a Richard F. French Award for outstanding doctoral work. A graduate of the Hanns Eisler Academy in Berlin, she also taught at Juilliard and Smith College. Ms. Stepanova is currently Assistant Professor of Piano at the University of



Georgia, Hugh Hodgson School of Music. Jeffrey Zeigler was the cellist of the internationally renowned Kronos Quartet for eight seasons. Enjoying a genre-defying, multifaceted career, he has also collaborated with members of the Eroica Trio and the Cleveland and

St. Lawrence Quartets.

Mr. Zeigler has appeared as a soloist with the Los Angeles Philharmonic, Toronto Symphony, Royal Danish Radio Symphony, Basel Symphonie, and the Brooklyn Philharmonic, among others. He holds a BM degree from the Eastman School of Music and a MM degree from Rice University serving as the Teaching Assistant for Paul Katz. He continued his studies at IU – Bloomington with Janos Starker. From 1998–2004 he was a member of the Corigliano Quartet (1999 Fischoff Grand Prize Winner), which served as the Lisa Arnholt Quartet-in-Residence at Juilliard.

Zeigler has been the recipient of the Avery Fisher Prize, Polar Music Prize, President's Merit Award from the National Academy of Recorded Arts, the Chamber Music America Richard J. Bogomolny National Service Award, and The Asia Society's Cultural Achievement Award. Zeigler is on the Cello Faculty at Mannes College The New School For Music and has been published on John Zorn's ARCANA series. He is a regular contributor to CelloBello and to Q2 of WQXR.

Junior Division Winds/Brass Jurors



Award-winning saxophonist, pedagogue, and soprano chair of the Assembly Quartet, Jeffrey Heisler, serves on the faculty of Oakland University (Rochester, MI) as Associate Professor of Saxophone. He is a 2005 Fischoff Competition Gold Medalist as the soprano saxophonist with

the Blue Square Saxophone Quartet.

Dr. Heisler has worked with award-winning composers on world premiere and North American premiere works, and has performed with the Detroit Symphony, Michigan Opera Theatre, Brave New Works, the Jimmy Dorsey Orchestra, Benny Goodman Orchestra, John Philip Sousa Band, Toledo Symphony Orchestra, Midland Symphony Orchestra, and the Stuttgart Ballet Orchestra.

He has been a featured soloist with the Oakland Symphony Orchestra, Motor City Symphony, and Spartanburg Symphony Orchestra among others. Heisler's acclaimed debut solo album "Gradient" was nominated for a Grammy Award in classical music along with the Assembly Quartet's most recent CD "in search of stillness."

In 2010, Dr. Heisler became the first Doctor of Musical Arts to graduate from Bowling Green State University's (BGSU) contemporary music program, and he holds a MM degree in saxophone performance from BGSU. He earned his Bachelor of Music Education degree from Central Michigan University. Jeffrey Heisler is a Selmer and Legere Performing Artist-Clinician.



Internationally-acclaimed trumpeter Marc Reese is best known for his nearly two-decade tenure with the Empire Brass Quintet. As an orchestral musician, he has performed with the New York Philharmonic, Cleveland Orchestra, and the Boston Symphony, and the

Tanglewood, Ravinia, Blossom, Marlboro, and Pacific Music Festival. He joined the faculty of Interlochen Arts Camp in 2018.

Reese served on the board of the Florida State Music Teachers Association as its Composition Commissioning Chair, and is a board member of the International Trumpet Guild.

As Assistant Dean/Brass Department Head at Lynn University's Conservatory of Music, he is the Founder/Artistic Director of the Roger Voisin Memorial Trumpet Competition. He designed a new mouthpiece with master craftsman Ken Larson called the Reesepiece and authored an iBook utilizing Clarke's Technical Studies to improve double tonguing: Repurposing Clarke.

In high school, Reese studied at Tanglewood and Juilliard with Mel Broiles and Mark Gould. He received his BM from Boston University and his MM from the New England Conservatory. He resides in Florida with his wife, pianist Lisa Leonard, and their two sons.



Toyin Spellman-Diaz has built a reputation as a world-class oboist. As an orchestral musician, Ms. Spellman-Diaz has performed in the New York Philharmonic, the Chicago Symphony, the Chicago Civic Orchestra, the Milwaukee Symphony, the American Symphony

Orchestra, the Brooklyn Philharmonic, Orpheus and Orchestra of St. Luke's. She has performed numerous solo works with the Chicago Civic Orchestra, Manhattan Virtuosi, the Antara Ensemble and at the Kennedy Center in Washington, DC where she was hailed as having a "smooth, controlled tone and excellent technique" by the Washington Post.

Her chamber music credits outside of Imani Winds include playing with such esteemed groups as Alarm Will Sound and Camerata Pacifica. Ms. Spellman-Diaz graduated with a BM from the Oberlin Conservatory, and a Master's degree and Professional Studies degree from the Manhattan School of Music. She is on faculty at Brooklyn College.

Senior Division Strings/Piano Jurors



Marian Hahn has been a member of the piano and chamber music faculties at the Peabody Conservatory since 1987, and currently holds the Singapore Conservatory of Music Chair in Piano. She was instrumental in the founding of the Yong Siew Toh Conservatory

of Music at the National University of Singapore and was in residence during fall 2007. She serves frequently as a competition juror, most notably at the Geneva International Piano competition, Concert Artists Guild (CAG), MTNA, Fischoff, and Hilton Head International.

Recognized equally for her prowess as a solo and chamber music pianist, she won top prizes in the International Leventritt, CAG, and was a top prizewinner in the University of Maryland and Kosciuszko competitions. She has performed with the Cleveland Orchestra, Boston Pops, and the Jacksonville Symphony.

As a chamber artist, Hahn has appeared at Marlboro, Sedona, Rockport, and Grand Canyon festivals, and was a long-time faculty artist at the Kneisel Hall Chamber Music Festival in Maine. A founding member of the Amabile Piano Quartet, she also toured extensively as a member of the Amadeus Trio. A Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Oberlin College with a major in Comparative Religion, Hahn received her MM degree from Juilliard.



Violinist Daniel Phillips enjoys a versatile career as an established chamber musician, solo artist, and teacher. A Juilliard graduate, his major teachers were his father, Eugene Phillips, Ivan Galamian, Sally Thomas, Nathan Milstein, Sandor Vegh, and George Neikrug. He is a

founding member of the 30-year-old Orion String Quartet, which is in residence at Mannes College of Music and performs regularly at The Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center. Since winning the 1976 Young Concert Artists Competition, he has performed as a soloist with many orchestras, including the Pittsburgh, Houston, New Jersey, Phoenix, San Antonio, and Yakima symphonies. He appears at the Spoleto USA Festival, Santa Fe Chamber Music Festival, Chamber Music Northwest, Chesapeake Music Festival, and has participated in the International Musicians Seminar in Cornwall, England since its inception. He also serves on the summer faculty of the Heifetz Institute and the St. Lawrence String Quartet Seminar at Stanford. A judge in the 2018 Seoul International Violin Competition, he is a professor at the Aaron Copland School of Music at Queens College and on the faculties of the Mannes College of Music, Bard College Conservatory, and The Juilliard School. He lives with his wife on Manhattan's upper west side.



Michael Reynolds has been the cellist of the award-winning Muir String Quartet since its inception in 1979. Accolades include first prize at the Evian Competition, 1981 Naumberg Award, two Grand Prix du Disques, Gramophone Award, a Grammy

nomination, and a Grammy award on the EcoClassics label he founded, as well as the PBS broadcast, "In Performance at The White House" for President and Mrs. Reagan. A native of Montana, he received his professional training at the Curtis Institute of Music and Yale University.

A prolific recording artist, all profits from Mr. Reynolds' recordings support an organization of which he is Co-Founder, Executive, and Artistic Director - Classics for Kids Foundation. The Foundation's grant programs have awarded thousands of beautiful new stringed instruments to hundreds of string programs across the U.S.

He is also Artistic Director of ArtsLIVE! in Fredericksburg, Virginia, and the Montana Chamber Music Society, the first statewide chamber music society in America. Mr. Reynolds received an honorary doctorate from Rhode Island College (1995), and has served as a faculty member at Boston University's College of Fine Arts since 1983. In his spare time he is an avid fly fisherman and outdoorsman.



Sabina Thatcher began her tenure as principal viola of The Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra (SPCO) in 1989 and remained until 2012. She was a featured soloist with SPCO performing repertoire including Penderecki Viola Concerto, Mozart Sinfonia Concertante,

Hindemith Kammermusik, and John Harbison's Viola Concerto. Ms. Thatcher was a finalist in the Naumberg International Viola Competition, and has performed solo recitals domestically and internationally. She was a member of the Rosalyra String Quartet (1990 Fischoff Senior Division Strings/Piano Silver Medalist) in their 1996 New York debut, a distinguished artist and teacher at the Robert McDuffie Center for Strings (Mercer University), and served as artist-faculty at the Aspen Music Festival and School from 1998–2016. She received her BM degree (with distinction) and the Performer's Certificate from the Eastman School of Music and studied further at Juilliard with Lillian Fuchs. During that time, she toured with the Brandenburg Ensemble under the direction of Alexander Schneider and was a prizewinner in the Hudson Valley Competition. Ms. Thatcher currently teaches at Macalester College and is an adjunct professor at the University of Minnesota.

Gregory Hustis, former Principal Horn (1976-2012) and Principal Horn Emeritus (2012-2014) of the Dallas Symphony Orchestra is an active conductor, educator, and advocate for the arts. Mr. Hustis taught horn for over 30 years at Southern Methodist

University (SMU), where in 1995 he was presented the Meadows Foundation Distinguished Teaching Award. In addition to SMU, Mr. Hustis serves as Director of the Wind Ensemble and University Orchestra at the University of Texas at Dallas, and was appointed Music Director of the Metropolitan Winds. He serves as Artistic Director of the Music in the Mountains festival in Durango, Colorado. A graduate of the Curtis Institute, he has appeared with the Philadelphia Orchestra, toured with Summit Brass, and performed with Lorin Maazel and the World Philharmonic Orchestra in Rio de Janeiro.

In addition to his performance schedule, Mr. Hustis has served on numerous boards/advisory committees, including the Dallas Symphony, Greater Dallas Youth Orchestra, International Horn Society, the American Horn Competition, Voices of Change, Blue Candlelight Series, the Dallas Center for the Performing Arts Foundation, and the Dallas Chamber Music Society, where he serves as vice-president. Mr. Hustis co-founded TrumCor — a company which manufactures and distributes mutes for brass instruments.



Frank Kowalsky has performed as principal clarinetist with orchestras throughout the United States, including the Seattle Symphony Orchestra, the Pacific Northwest Ballet Orchestra, the Bellingham Festival, the Naples Philharmonic, Tallahassee Symphony

Orchestra, and Northwood Orchestra. He has also been a member of the United States Marine Band, the Colorado Philharmonic, the Rochester Philharmonic, the Seattle Chamber Music Festival, and Music at Gretna. His introduction of Scott McAllister's "X-Concerto for Clarinet" to the clarinet community in 1998 led to the commissioning of McAllister's concerto, "Black Dog", which was written for him and premiered at Florida State University in 2003. A member of the faculty at the Interlochen Arts Academy for over a decade, he was the Professor of Clarinet at Florida State University from 1984 until his retirement in 2013. He holds degrees from the Eastman School of Music, the Manhattan School of Music, and the Catholic University of America, and now makes his home in Seattle, WA.



Dr. Otis Murphy, Jr. is Professor of Saxophone at the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music. At the age of 28, he joined the faculty, becoming one of the youngest members in its history. Dr. Murphy has garnered a number of international awards including prizes in

Belgium's Adolphe Sax International Saxophone Competition and France's Jean-Marie Londeix International Saxophone Competition. He has taught at music schools/festivals worldwide including the Paris Conservatory, Amsterdam Conservatory, Cologne Academy of Music, Hamamatsu International Wind Instrument Academy and Festival, Japan Band Clinic, Institut Franz Schubert, Kunitachi College of Music, Liceu de Barcelona, Madrid Royal Conservatory, Midwest Clinic, Musashino Academy of Music, Nagoya College of Music, Osaka College of Music, London Royal College of Music, Shanghai Conservatory, and the Sydney Conservatorium.

Dr. Murphy holds Doctor of Music and MM degrees from the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music, graduating with the Performer's Certificate. In addition, he pursued advanced studies in France under a Fulbright Fellowship for foreign study as a pupil of Jean-Yves Fourmeau at the Conservatoire National Régional de Musique in Cergy-Pontoise, earning the Prix de Perfectionnement à l'unanimité. Dr. Murphy leads a fulfilling life with his wife, pianist Haruko Murphy, and their six children.



Marie Speziale, Professor Emerita of Trumpet and Chair of the Brass Department at the Shepherd School of Music at Rice University, is acknowledged as the first woman trumpeter in a major symphony orchestra. Ms. Speziale retired from the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra

in November 1996 after serving as Associate Principal Trumpet for thirty-two years (1964–1996). She remains an active performer with the St. Louis Symphony, DIVA (women's jazz band), and with the Monarch Brass Quintet/Monarch Brass Ensemble, which she conducted at the International Women's Brass Conferences, and the 2015 International Trumpet Guild (ITG) Conference.

As an instructor, she taught at the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music — of which she is a proud alumna — Indiana University Jacobs School of Music, and has taught at the Round Top Festival Institute since 2011.

In 2018, Ms. Speziale was inducted into the Cincinnati Jazz Hall of Fame honoring the Symphony Jazz Quintet, of which she was a founding member. She coaches brass at the New World Symphony and with the US Air Force Band, US Air Force Ceremonial Brass, and the US Army Field Band. Ms. Speziale has performed for such luminaries as Igor Stravinsky, George Szell, Leonard Bernstein and Aaron Copland.
